Illinois Legislator Held for Illegal Profiteering

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — (AP) — State Rep. James J. Adduci, Chicago, was indicted by a Sangamon county grand jury Monday on a charge of profiting illegally from a state contract.
Adduci, 51-year-old Republican, is serving his ninth two-year term in the Illinois house.
The indictment contained four counts and accused him of getting about \$5,000 in commissions on state envelopes purchased from the Central Envelope and Lithographing Co., Chicago.
Adduci was charged specifically with violating a state law prohibiting a legislator from being inter-
