Luise Rainer, Winner of Oscars, Reviews Career

HOLLYWOOD. (AP) Oscar contenders who are now campaigning frantically for Hollywood's biggest prize may be sobered by the words of Luise Rainer.

The Viennese actress holds the record for the most amazing achievement in Academy history. She won the top acting award two years in a row—in 1936 for "The Good Earth," and in 1937 for "The Great Ziegfeld."

"I'm afraid there was a great deal of bad feeling at MGM when I left. But I don't see why there should have been. The studio had done all right with me. During most of the time I was paid \$250 a week."

"Does she regret having left? "Not under the circumstances," she replied. "I don't regret the 10 years of absence, because now I am a more mature and happier person. My only regret is not affording my talent the scope of the motion picture, which permits reaching a much greater audience than the stage."

"I definitely plan to return to the screen. Paul Gallico is working on a script for me and we hope to film it independently."

"Miss Rainer doesn't lack interest in this year's Oscar race. She hopes Judy Holliday will win. "She was wonderful," the two-time winner said. "You know she must be very intelligent, to play someone so dumb."
