TIP O' THE MORNING: Jack Webb of "Dragnet" may star in a radio series called "Pete Kelly Blues," musical dramas about a prohibition-era saxophone player.

The wit, the keen mind, the human spirit, the deep love of Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes are reflected clearly in "The Mag-nificent Yankee," film version of Emmet Lavery's successful play, which opens Friday at the Park-way theater.

This is a love story, and a real one; there is nothing synthetic about Louis Calhern's picture of abiding affection for his wife, nor about Ann Harding's portrayal of Mrs. Holmes' deep love for her husband. Calhern's performance is as magnificent as the man he portrays, as honest in conception as Holmes was in spirit. Edward Franz plays Louis Brandeis convincingly, and Miss Harding is excellent as Mrs. Holmes. Ian Wolfe is first-rate, too, as Adams, the chronic worrier, but Philip Ober makes something of a stuffed shirt out of author Owen Wister. There is some good work among the Holmes secretaries, who replace for a time the sons he was denied. Just about the only false note in the picture comes in a sentimentalized version of their birthday party for the aging justice. You'll be doing yourself a favor when you see it.
