Man Fires Shot From Wheelchair at Wife, Kills Self

OLEAN, N. Y., March 13. (AP) Shooting from a wheelchair on a busy street corner, a 34-year-old husband pumped bullets into an office where his estranged wife and a fellow employe covered late yesterday. Then, as police closed in, Alfred C. Joy spun his chair around the corner and killed himself with the .22 rifle, Deputy Sheriff Maurice Jennings said. Neither Joy's wife, Kathryn, nor Clyde Aiferlink, her coworker at a furnace company, was wounded. Police said Joy and Mrs. Joy had talked on the corner about a divorce. Since their separation last fall, she had been living with relatives in Shinglehouse, Pa. When Joy put together a disassembled gun and threatened Mrs. Joy, she screamed. Aiferlink dashed from the office and pulled her inside. During the shooting, Mrs. Joy and Aiferlink crouched on the office floor. Aiferlink telephoned police. Police said Joy had been paralyzed from the waist down since a tree fell on him in 1945 while working on a farm.

WOMEN WIN TOWN ELECTION

'We'll Do Better' Vow Wins in Michigan

MENDON, Mich., March 13. (AP) The women—and should anybody be surprised?—are in control here. The novelty, if any, is that this has to do with politics. In the village election a female ticket swept the boards yesterday. It wasn't even close for any office. There will be one lonesome male officeholder. He is incumbent City Clerk Vern McClish. He wasn't opposed. Mrs. Helen Hickmott, former Kalamazoo College teacher, was elected village president. She won over Marvin Daiman, incumbent, by a vote of 77 to 43. The women campaigned on a general platform that they could do a better job of running the village government than men. The result was a rousing good vote turnout—a total of 120. This southwestern Michigan community has a population of 750. "We'll do our best," said Mrs. Hickmott proudly after her victory. She and her husband run Mendon's biggest department store. While it was a clearcut triumph for the women, it also was self-evident that a good many men were willing to give them the chance. -Of the total vote cast, 68 were by men and 52 by women. Among the winners were Mrs. Mary Male, who beat out her husband, Gordon Male, for a one-year term as trustee, 73 to 43.

House Committee on Peace Proposed

WASHINGTON, March 13. (AP) Rep. Flood (D-Pa.) today proposed a House committee on peace. He advocated it in a prepared House speech and drafted a bill to carry it out. Flood said America's primary aim is world peace. He said all American military and diplomatic efforts are directed toward world peace. So he asked, why not set up a committee on peace? The 25-member group would be authorized "to consider and evaluate plans and programs for the promotion of world peace pre- sented by or in the United Na- tions and other organizations."

U. S. Finances Study of Babies' Deaths

WASHINGTON, March 13. (AP) The government is financing a study into the cause of sudden and unexpected deaths of appar- ently healthy babies. The National Institute of Health, a branch of the U. S. Public Health Service, announced today it has allotted \$40,122 for the study. It noted that about 1600 babies under one year of age die yearly of what is diagnosed as "accidental mechanical suffoca- tion."

PRETTY COOL IN LIFE CLASSES

TORONTO, March 13. (AP) Eleven beautiful artists models here say that rising costs, cold drafts in studios and baby sitters are making their lives anything but a bed of sables. They've joined the Artists Models Federal Union (AMFU) and are trying to recruit 39 similar posers, as well as fashion and photographic models, in their drive for more money and better conditions. The girls told AMFU Canadian organizer Russell Harvey they are paid \$1.25 an hour and haven't had a raise since 1947. On call seven days a week, they said they average only \$20 to \$30 a week, and from it must pay all expenses, even baby sit- ters for those with babies. Their two biggest employers are the Ontario College of Art and the board of education. At the college, one model com- plained about poorly heated studios and the drafts on her bare skin in life classes. "Why sometimes I get so chilled I can't speak," she said.
