Why Is Easter 'So Early'?

Easter ranks among the important feasts of the year. Except for Christmas, and perhaps Thanksgiving, it seems to be at the top of all our feasts.
Last year Easter came on the ninth of April, but this year it is earlier. We have different dates for Easter because of a decision which was made in early Christian times. The church fathers decided that the feast should come on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after Mar. 21. Spring usually commences on Mar. 21.
The moon makes regular journeys around the earth, but these do not last quite a month. Because of that fact, the full moon does not appear at the same monthly date each year.
According to the church rules, Easter cannot come earlier than Mar. 22, or later than Apr. 25.

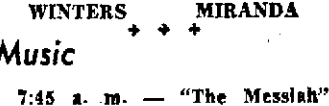
Sunday's Crossword Puzzle
