

the university announced Sunday, Total enrolment is 14,460, down 1,306 from last semester. Because of enlistments in the armed forces, and the large number of midyear graduates—some 1,300— university officials said they had expected a larger drop-off.

This semester 3,068 advanced students enrolled in the graduate school, compared with 3,126 last fall, Undergraduates number 10,-365 against 11,620 in September.
