Bill Doudna's SPOTLIGHT 'Ethan Frome'

TIP O' THE MORNING: Sound-alike songs: "May the Good Lord Bless and Keep You" and "Drifting Along on Dreamy River."

The grim story of Ethan Frome, dramatized by Owen and Donald Davis is from Edith Wharton's novel of that name, was told Tuesday night at the Wisconsin Union theater by Wisconsin Players...

While the student actors had caught the feeling of the drama, and played it with intensity and fire, there were times at which unexpected laughter caused scenes to lose the emotional impact toward which they were building.

It's hard to say why this happened. Most likely, it was in part a tendency in the early scenes to try too hard for a light touch; and in part the unfamiliar scene and manners—those of New England of the '90s. Happily or unhappily, Director Jonathan Curvin and his cast were giving a pretty authentic picture of the time and place.

The few flaws were minor—such as a New England girl's failure to protect her only good dress with an apron while she washed dishes and the absence of apple cider.

Wallace Kennedy, as Frome; Diane Foster, as his wife, Zenobia; and Marie Iezzi, as Mattie Silver, the cousin with whom he fell in love, gave first-rate performances, as did Robert Peterson, as Jotham, the unpaid man-of-all-work.

In brief, the story was of a lachrymose Yankee—Frome—who had married, out of sheer loneliness, the woman who had nursed his mother in her last illness; Zenobia immediately turned into a querulous hypochondriac, using Ethan's every dollar for medicine and treatments and demanding more, more, more.

To them came Mattie, Zenobia's cousin, who worked without pay, enduring the wife's eternal nagging and ministering to her insupportable needs completely right up to the time she was killed.

Most of the drama was in the hands of Kennedy and the Misses Foster and Iezzi, who sustained the difficult roles largely through their intense characterizations.

David Weiss' settings—a bare bedroom, a compact kitchen, and a couple of snowy exteriors—were vivid and completely right.

Curvin's direction, in which he was assisted by Glen Loney, kept the drama moving steadily throughout its three hours, despite the slow speech and long pauses necessary to the roles. A feeling of jollity about a dancing party

Milwaukee Harvester Workers End Strike

MILWAUKEE — (UP)—About 5,000 AFL workers at the International Harvester Co. plant here voted Tuesday afternoon to end their six-day-old strike and return to work today.

The workers, members of the AFL federal union, decided at a membership meeting to resume work while their leaders negotiate with the company in a dispute over time studies and piecework rates.

The union members withdrew their 400 pickets from the plant shortly after noon.

The workers walked out Thursday, claiming the company's way of making time studies and setting piecework rates violated their five-year contract signed a few months ago.
