# No TV at Once in Madison

State Journal Music Editor is virtualy unchanged since the last report in this department.

Television for Madison is still at least 18 months away, and perhaps much longer, depending upon the international situation.

The only favorable change is the fact that when television chan-nels are allocated, one of those, presently in use will be assigned to the city. And there is some question about the desirability of this from the viewpoint of the consumer, since it will mean that, if he wants to receive all Madison telecasts, he will have to have a receiver which will pick up the ultra high frequencies (UHF) as well as the very high (VHF).

Under the present plan, one very high frequency —in the currently used band—will be assigned to Madison, along with three ultra highs. Three stations have applied for licenses—WIBA, WKOW, and






