Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll, originators and portrayals of the radio Amos and Andy will turn these assignments on TV to others, using Negro talent for the roles.

## Floating Mines Kill 63 in Japan

TOKYO, April 5. (UP) Floating mines, presumed from North Korea, killed 63 persons, injured 50 and damaged 2000 homes along Japan's coast in the last four months, the Japanese maritime board announced today.  
Forty-three mines washed onto Japan's shores between December and March. Many exploded. They caused greatest damage in fishing villages. Seventy-eight others were tracked down in the Japan Sea.  
Communists heavily mined the Wonsan harbor on Korea's east coast last year to delay United Nations landings. It was believed the Reds also let some mines float out to sea.

## Screen Writer King Battles Drug Habit

NEW YORK, April 5. (UP) Alexander King, 51-year-old Hollywood screen writer, pleaded guilty yesterday to a charge of forging a prescription to obtain narcotics.  
Assistant U. S. Attorney David Carton said King acquired the habit several years ago while being treated for a kidney ailment.  
A federal judge, Sidney Sugerman, placed King on probation for three years when he agreed voluntarily to take treatment in the government hospital at Lexington, Ky.

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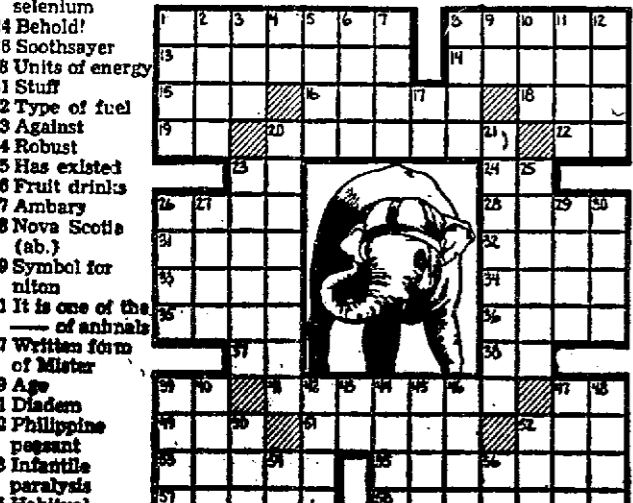
