The Sunday Spotlight: A Guest Column Student Art Is 'Stimulating'

Pieces of work in certain categories are eligible from any student on campus. The faculty of the art departments exercise slight influence on what students decide to submit, and none at all on what the out-of-town jury selects.

On the contrary, expressionist, cubist, surreal fragments—and fragmentations—are all to be found somewhere. Every year's show has its own emphasis in media. This year the painting is excellent and varied in the oils; there are good pieces in the encaustic media and relatively little in water color. Landscapes of varying degrees of naturalism and abstraction dominate the paintings. In this group are included Peter Sinclair's "Riveted Cityscape," George Alfano's "Capital City," Marge Hoffberg's "Pedestrian," and Pat Molm's "Trees." The work in metal craft and ceramics is of a uniformly high quality technically. In design, certain craftsmen have produced work of marked individuality. Fine work in metal and in metal used with other materials, particularly wood and bone, was done by Harry Horning in his "Emanon" and a silver pendant, Bill Lidh in his "Pendant," Irv Kinney in "Modern Man" and "Ear Ring," Corrine Helmeke in "Pendant," Adelaide Ryerson in "Enamelled Bowl," Don Heering in "Pendant," Don Meyer in "Pendant," Caroline Grether in "Silver Bowl" and "Pendant," Dennis Pratt in "Pendant," and Charlotte Aronson in "Silver Bowl."
