Sometimes you see a bridge player staring up at the ceiling while everybody waits for him to make a play.
What is he looking for? Inspiration. What should he be doing? Acting on the basis of knowledge instead of waiting for a sudden flash from a kindly Providence.
For example, the hand shown today would find many average players scanning the ceiling or scratching their heads. The expert acts as though there were nothing to think about.
When the hand was actually played, West opened the six of spades. East put up the queen, and South won with the ace.
Expert West knew at once that South had the jack of spades, since East would have played the jack rather than the queen if he had been able to do so.
South led another diamond, and West made the right play without a thought or a care in the world.
The average West would fret and stew about whether to put up the ace of diamonds or whether to hold off a second time.

Prof. Leo Steffens of the University of Wisconsin music school became the star of Sunday's concert at the Wisconsin Union theater by proving himself the master of the tricky and jazzy piano part in Constant Lambert's "The R10 Grande"—a new role for a pianist who had won his audiences' hearts with just about every other kind of music for his instrument.
In this highly colored contemporary work, the piano has the leading role much of the time, but Lambert has thrown in solo parts all over the place—vocal, brass, string, and percussion.
Jean Pfefferkorn's lovely contralto was the voice; Concertmaster Ruthmarie Reich had a nice bit; the brass gave with the jazz, and the percussion section used everything in sight, from tympani to triangle.
Eugene Schweitzer was cello soloist in Delius' "Caprice and Elvegy," which served mostly to display his pleasant and consistent tone; otherwise, the work was on the dry side.

Tuitions at Marquette Raised 10 Per Cent
