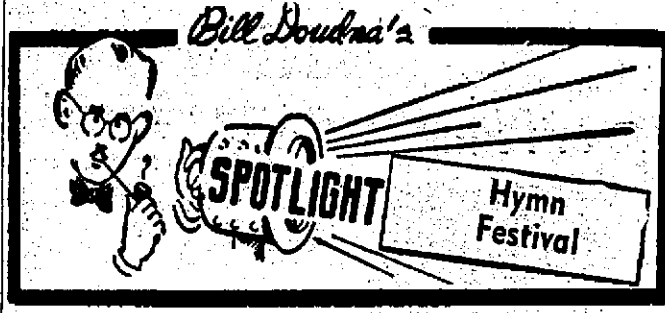

Like to sing hymns? Lots of people do, and they'll have the chance to sing the old ones and learn some new ones Sunday at the fourth annual city-wide hymn festival. The Wisconsin Association of Church Musicians, its sponsor, has invited Dr. Earl E. Harper of the State University of Iowa to return as guest conductor. The festival will begin at 4 p. m. in Luther Memorial church.

Dr. and Mrs. Harper will meet with persons interested in church music at a seminar at 4 p. m. Saturday in the Top Flight room of the Memorial Union. Anyone may attend and bring his specific problem, including work with junior choirs—Mrs. Harper's specialty. But the benefits of the festival will extend far beyond Sunday. An offering will be taken, and proceeds will go to help build up a library of church music for lending to choirs and choruses throughout the state.

The library was founded at the association's second festival, shortly after the death of Mrs. Paul Fulcher, Madison organist for whom it was named. The Louise Fulcher Memorial Library is administered by the University of Wisconsin extension division. Much of the organ music available came from Mrs. Fulcher's personal collection. The library contains about 30 sets of anthems, and considerable organ music. Vocal solos will be added to the shelves soon. Twenty-five copies of each anthem are available.

The music may be borrowed without charge, except for return postage, by "any responsible person or group in the state," according to the extension division. It may be obtained for either examination or use.
