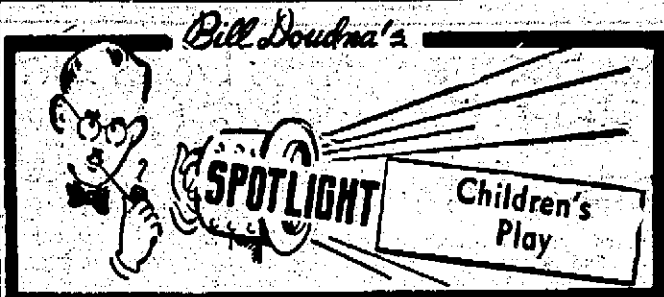

## Writer Describes 1951 Model A-Bomb

NEW YORK—(UP)—The 1951 model atom bomb is an "ugly thing," weighing 10,000 pounds and looking like a big hot water tank with a rounded nose, Look magazine said Monday in a copyrighted article.  
The article, illustrated by a drawing of the bomb's exterior, said the completely assembled bomb is "like nothing else on earth" and can be dropped with "astounding accuracy."  
It reported that the current bomb is about 20 feet long, 9 or 10 feet in diameter and can be set to explode 40 seconds after it is dropped from a bomber.  
(In Washington, the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) said in a statement: "The writer of the article in the current issue of Look magazine did not see an actual atomic weapon and the air force has assured the AEC that the writer did not see a representation of an atomic weapon.")

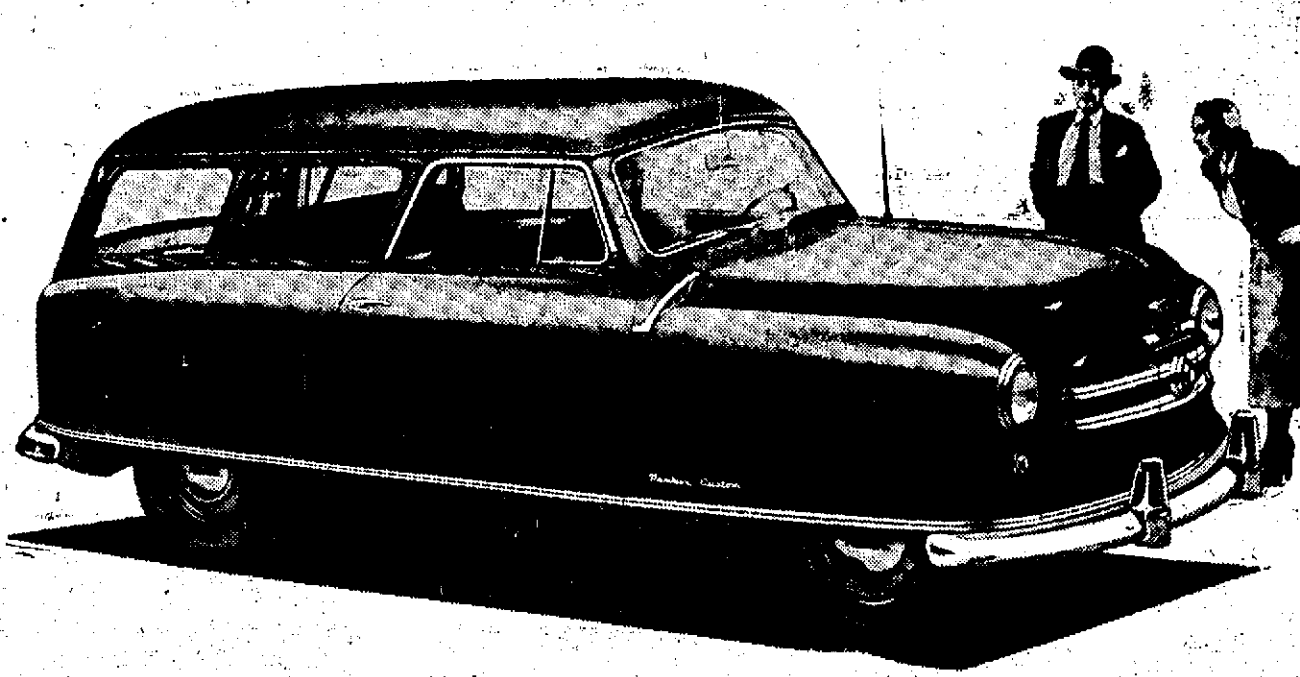
