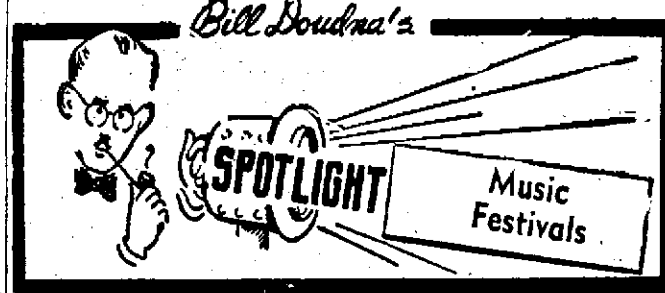

Two state solo-ensemble music festivals, instead of the usual one held in Madison, will be conducted this year by the Wisconsin School Music assn. Both will be May 12—one here, the other in Wausau. The Madison festival will be presented in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin music school.

One thousand high school musicians selected from the 15,000 appearing at the various district festivals will take part in the two events. Each festival will have an all-star concert by outstanding boys and girls at 7:15 p. m. when University scholarships will be awarded to 10 of them.

RADIO HONORS: The 11th annual George Foster Peabody awards, for the best productions in radio and television—generally regarded as the highest honors in those fields—were presented in New York on Thursday at a meeting of the Radio Executives club.

The American Broadcasting Co., its president, Robert L. Kintner, and his associates, Robert Saudek and Joseph McDonald, were given a special award "for their courageous stand in resisting organized pressures and their reaffirmation of basic American principles."

Another special award was won by the Providence, R. I., Journal, its editor and publisher Sevellon Brown, and reporter Ben Bagdikian, for a series of articles analyzing the broadcasts of radio commentators.
