

Scientists Find Electrified Air Slows Cancer in Rats, Some Malignancies Ebb

By FRANK CAREY Associated Press Science Writer CLEVELAND, April 28 (AP) — Two Florida scientists said today they are investigating the "possible use" of especially electrified air to try to retard or halt cancerous growths.

Their concept is that exposure of a cancer sufferer to especially electrified air might offset the abnormal electrical conditions within cancer cells and thus retard the growth of the malignancy and perhaps even halt it at some point.

Their studies indicate, they said, that certain electrical changes take place in the bodies of animals preceding the formation of cancerous tumors. There is suggestive evidence that a "pre-disposition to cancer in animals or humans" can be combated to some extent by changing the electrical content of the air they breathe, the researchers declared.

"Cancer in rats which breathed air saturated with negative ions developed very slowly, and in some instances even disappeared," they declared.

The scientists said their studies indicated that cancerous tissue has a different electric charge from that of the surrounding normal tissue. And they declared that apparently these electrical changes make the membrane of the cancer cell more permeable

Bar Association Hears Address on Safety Belts

ONE fundamental reason why persons are injured and killed in automobile accidents is the difference in velocity between the car and the passengers following an impact. The scientific explanation of traffic injuries and fatalities was given to members of the Long Beach Bar Association last night by William Harper, Pasadena physicist, who demonstrated how the wearing of a safety belt similar to those worn by plane passengers would prevent many traffic injuries and deaths. Some engineering changes in automobiles also would reduce greatly the number of injuries from this type of accident, he said.

Speaking at the association's dinner meeting at the Country Club on "Prevention and Reduction of Injuries in Traffic Accidents," Harper said the causes of accidents and the causes of injuries are not synonymous. The voting agreement was announced last night as the committee wound up three and a half weeks of closed-door discussions.
