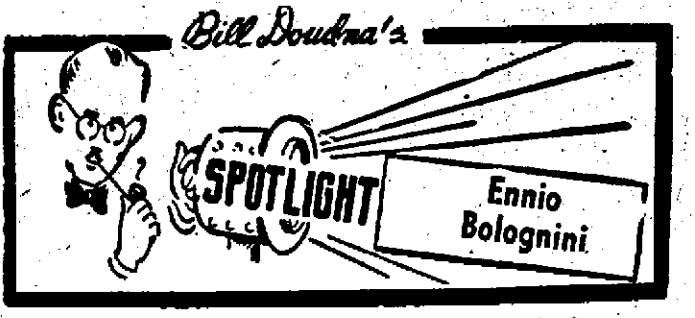

The women, members of about 28 Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish women's groups, will solicit funds on the corners of the city's various business sections from 11 a. m. to 9 p. m., according to Estelle Isenberg, secretary of the drive.

The university girls, representing Alpha Phi and Theta Phi sororities and Chadbourne hall, will collect contributions in the university area along State st. and University ave.

Each woman solicitor will receive a tin can for accepting contributions and a supply of miniature swords, symbol of the campaign, to pass out, one to each person who makes a cash contribution.

The organization will play the Sessions work in a concert at 8 p. m. Monday, May 28, in Music hall.

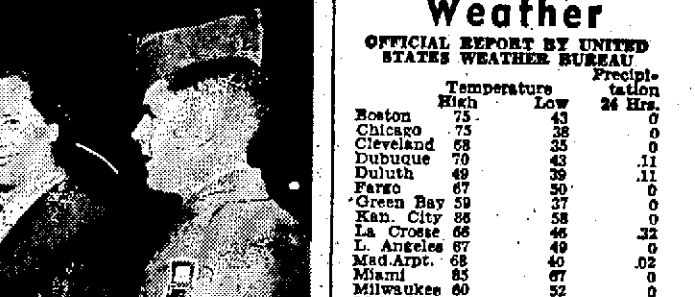
In the same program, Gunnar Johansen will play one of Sessions piano compositions and the composer and Kolisch will perform the duet.

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# JACOBY ON BRIDGE

The difference between proper play at rubber bridge and proper play at tournament bridge is clearly shown in today's hand, taken from Seattle's recent Northwest regional tournament.

Tom Myers, of Seattle, led the four of spades from the West hand, and Dan Lefebvre won with the ace.

Lefebvre returned the eight of spades, declarer put in the nine, and Meyers won with the ten. Declarer was now macked with the king and jack of spades, so Myers shifted to the ten of hearts.

Now declarer had a problem. He could surely win nine tricks by putting up the ace of hearts and knocking out the ace of diamonds.

But if he made only nine tricks and all the other declarers made ten tricks by means of a successful heart finesse, his name would be mud, his score would be poor, and his face would be red.

At rubber bridge nothing would matter but the safety of the contract.

At tournament bridge, South could not afford to give up the

Opening lead—4 ♠ play for an overtrick.

After some painful thought, therefore, declarer finessed the king of hearts, and lost to the queen of hearts, and back came another spade.

That was the end for poor South. He could run five clubs, one spade and two hearts—but he could not develop nine tricks without leading diamonds.

The moment he led diamonds, of course, West could take the diamond ace and as many spades as he still had.

# Congress Goes to N. Y., but Only for a Visit

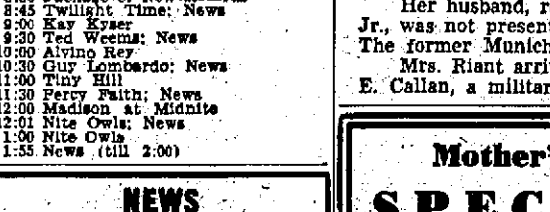
NEW YORK — (AP)—Congress came to New York Friday, but only for a visit.
