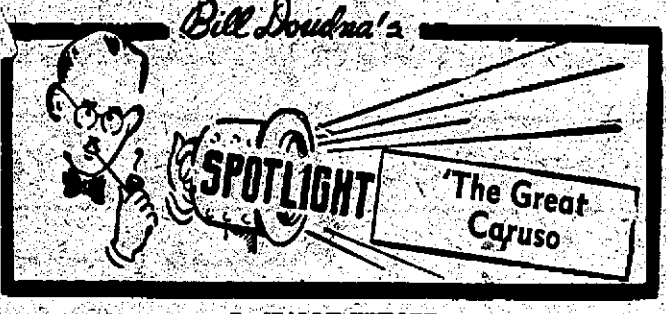

When a film like 'The Great Caruso' comes, it is an injustice to the purpose of its producers to review it as an ordinary movie.

Since the Technicolor film is a fairly accurate presentation of the great Italian's life, most of which was wrapped up with operatic performances, the Madison audience is seeing and hearing, in effect, excerpts from the familiar operas with enough biographical plot to capture the emotions of the audience and provide continued interest.

Long billed as the man with the voice most approaching that of Caruso, Mario Lanza performs magnificently in this, his greatest role since his discovery. Indeed, 'The Great Caruso' finally fully justifies handsome pictures. Lanza is, in addition, handsome and a good actor.

As Louise Heggar, his singing partner, Dorothy Kirsten does so admirably that she threatens to steal the show from the star more than once. Ann Blyth, cast as the girl who finally marries the singing idol, will surprise some moviegoers in the scene in which she sings 'When You're in Love' to her husband on the occasion of his birthday party.

No voice-dubbing was necessary, since Miss Blyth, used only for her acting in Hollywood, sang with the San Carlo Opera Co. for three seasons. The birthday song is one of the tenderest parts of a tender film.

Lanza sings 27 songs in the film, which necessitates considerable scene changing and photo-montage and leaves little room for full presentation of any one song. But the song editing is done smoothly and judiciously.

For those with an appreciation of a great voice — and we mean Lanza's as well as Caruso's — this film has had no equal since the development of talking pictures. It's a shame Hollywood is trying to sell this man as a new feminine idol. His voice should be above such cheap promotion.

Future films may be more popular because some persons have little use for opera, but it will be a long time before anyone hears so much true singing within one movie.
