ACHESON IS RAPPED IN SCIENTIST'S CASE

WASHINGTON, May 8 — (AP) Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) accused Secretary of State Dean Acheson today of trying to get the Navy to reinstate a suspended scientist who McCarthy said was a "communist agent."

McCarthy told the senate "immense pressure" is being applied to restore Stephen Brunauer to his job in naval explosives work and the State Department is exerting the principal influence.

Even so, he said, "the Acheson group" concedes that Brunauer "is dangerous and he is involved in espionage work."

Brunauer was suspended by the Navy April 30 as a "security risk." At the same time the State Department suspended the scientist's wife, Mrs. Esther Brunauer, explaining the action was taken because of the Navy's move against her husband.
