Writer Doubts Sale of ABC to CBS Is Possible

HOLLYWOOD. Here is the greatest place in the country for a small whisper to suddenly build up into a gigantic explosion of rumor.

The "hot" issue presently, is the rumor that CBS is to purchase the American Broadcasting Co., lock, stock and barrel, for a reported \$1,000,000.

Let's take the story and break it down. In the first place, the FCC would not allow the singular ownership of two networks. This was once the case with NBC when they had their Red and Blue networks. They were required to dispose of one, which was the Blue net, then becoming ABC.

The real estate and equipment assets alone hardly would warrant the price to CBS. CBS already has their quota at seven owned radio stations, therefore could not take on any more.

From a TV angle, CBS could gain an outlet in Chicago, where they presently are not represented, but they can build this outlet for a fraction of the rumored sale price.

Broken down, it doesn't appear feasible.

Italy Government Crews Back on Job

ROME, May 9. (AP) Italy's government workers went back to work today after a 24-hour "no decision" strike for higher pay.

Premier Alcide de Gasperi's cabinet, which turned down the demands for pay boosts, is considering new legislation to outlaw strikes against the government.

The Communist and non-Red unions which joined in the walk-out promised further agitation and stoutly opposed any anti-strike laws.

Chinese Reds Slay 50,000 in Province

TAIPEH, Formosa, May 9. (AP) The Nationalist Chinese defense ministry today said Chinese Reds had executed 50,000 persons in the South China province of Kwangsi in a single month.

The executions were described as part of a massive effort to stamp out non-Communist resistance in that strategic province, which borders Indochina.

The ministry said the Communists were using 400,000 men in an attempt to destroy Nationalist guerrilla forces in Kwangsi.

Czech Spy in West Germany Sentenced

STUTTGART, Germany, May 9. (AP) An American court sentenced a 35-year-old Czech to 12 years imprisonment for gathering U. S. military information and sending it to Czechoslovakia.

The court, passing sentence last night, disclosed that it had cost the American government \$50,000 to conduct the investigation which resulted in the conviction of Emil Szwiertna.

Testimony disclosed that Szwiertna hung around U. S. 7th Army headquarters here to collect information. When he was successful, he hid his notes in marmalade jars, buried them, and a confederate dug them up and took them across the border.

His accomplice has not been apprehended.

Italian Proposal

ROME, May 9. (AP) Italy has proposed that Gen. Maurizio Lazzaro de Castiglione be named commander of south European land forces under Gen. Dwight Eisenhower. Gen. Castiglione was promoted to general in command of an army corps in 1947. He is in command of forces in the Verona area.

Malaya British Killed

SINGAPORE, May 9. (AP) British Army Headquarters announced today 287 officers and men were killed and 421 were wounded in Malayan jungle warfare against Communist guerrillas since June, 1948.

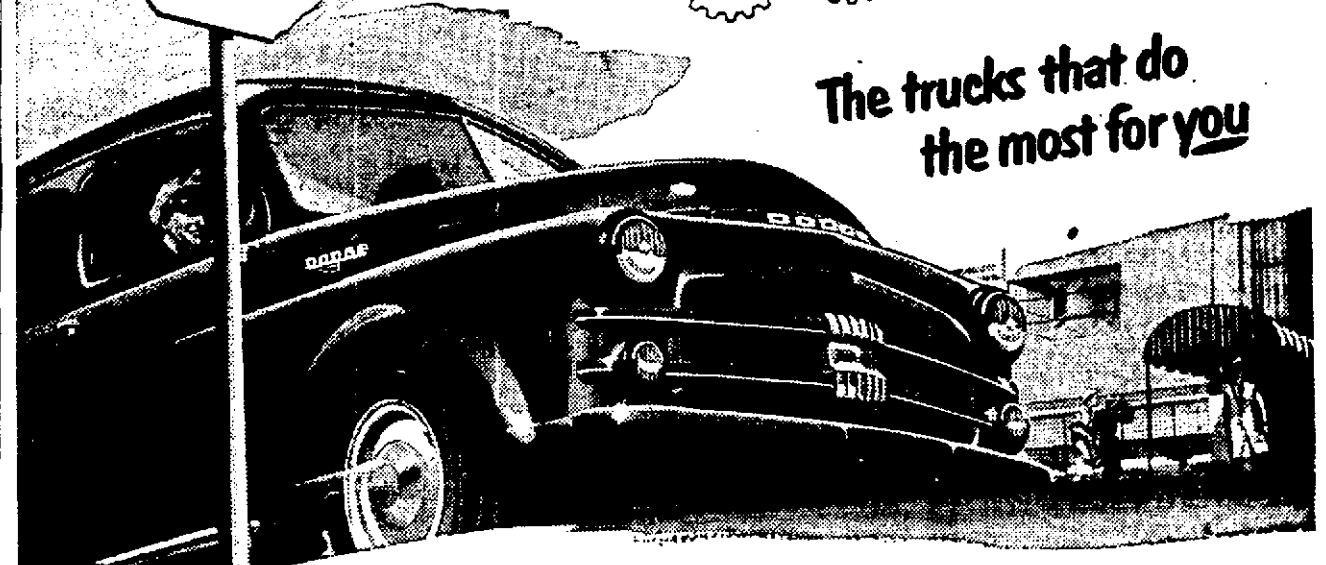
