Defense Official Boasts of Troop Mobilization
CHICAGO—(U.P.)—Army Secretary Frank Pace, Jr., said Saturday that the U. S. put more troops into Korea in the first four months than it sent into North Africa 11 months after America entered World War II.

"In four months we had more men and arms on the ground in Korea than we sent into the invasion of North Africa 11 months after Pearl Harbor," Pace said in an Armed Forces Day address to the civic luncheon club.

Pace did not elaborate, but army record show that nine divisions took part in the North African assault, with supporting troops in the rear areas. A full army division then consisted of 15,000 men, compared with more than 18,000 now.

He said the U. S. military effort in Korea is "clear proof that, if necessary, we will fight any aggressor who dares to threaten our liberties and our security."

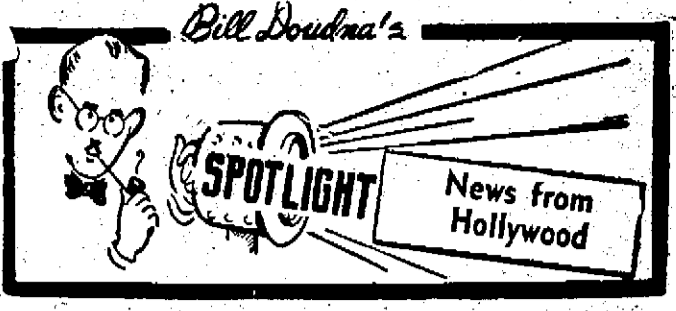

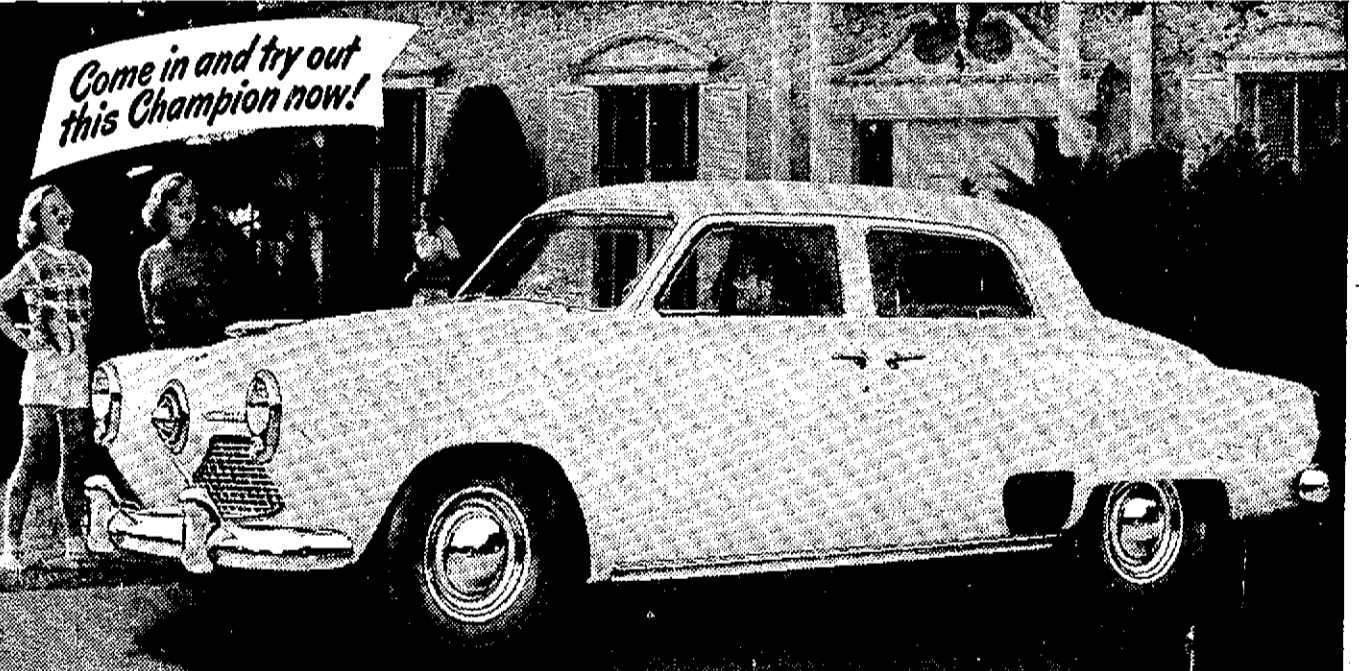
Joan Leslie will be the femme lead opposite Cornel Wilde in "California Conquest" to be Technicolor at Columbia pronto.
