Bradley Flies With Wedemeyer

Capt. Willis W. Bradley Jr., USN, ret., former Representative in Congress from Long Beach, was a passenger yesterday aboard the plane of Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer who flew back to the coast after testifying for three days at the MacArthur hearings. "His viewpoint is sound and is tremendously more along the lines of MacArthur than that of Gen. Marshall," Capt. Bradley said. "It is a loss to the country to have him retire Aug. 1 in view of his long experience in the Far East. He advocates getting out of Korea if we don't soon find a means of winning a victory; I don't think we should continue to suffer tragically heavy losses there."
