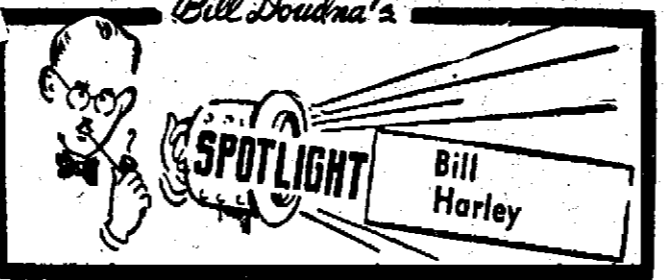

49% Less Beef Being Produced

CHICAGO (U.P.)—The American Meat Institute reported Friday that beef production by leading packers observing ceiling prices was 49 per cent less this week than it was a year ago.

The institute said it obtained the data in a survey of 95 leading beef producing plants. The institute noted that whereas beef production dropped 49 per cent in complying plants compared with a year ago, cattle sold at the nation's 12 leading markets were only 17 per cent less this week than a year ago.
