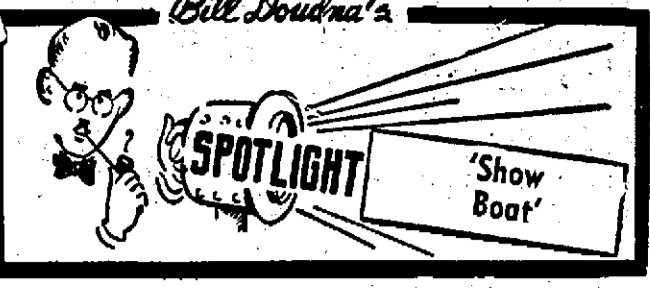

TIP O' THE MORNING: A Broadway "Halls of Ivy" is being plotted, with the Colmans getting first chance at the leading roles.

Besides the music of Jerome Kern, the new movie version of "Show Boat" has plenty of good things—among them the singing of Howard Keel, William Warfield, and Kathryn Grayson; the dancing of Marge and Gower Champion, and vivid Technicolor production. The film was previewed Tuesday at the Capitol theater by theater operators, leaders in Madison's musical life, and the press.

One thing stands out above all others—the way in which the picture stays with the love story of Magnolia Hawks, daughter of the Cotton Blossom show boat's owner, and Gaylord Ravenal, handsome river gambler, instead of wandering about in utter disregard of the plot, as do most musicals.

Miss Grayson is a lovely Magnolia, with voice to match, and Keel plays the handsome gambler with considerable credibility. Ava Gardner is Julie, the actress who starts downward because of a sailor's jealousy. Her singing of "My Bill" is one of the high points of picture, largely because of its sincerity—something which is missing in her other songs.

Warfield's beautiful bass voice is just right for "Ol' Man River," and the "Champions" dancing is something to remember.

Joe E. Brown and Agnes Moorehead contribute the film's few laughs in their roles as Capt. Andy and his wife, Parthy.

One can quarrel seriously with only two points in the production—the beginning, which over-glamorizes the show boat in lush Hollywood style, and the final scene, which has the time-wrecked Julie sobbing over the show boat's departure.

Even though at least three major Hollywood studios are doing pictures born of the song, "Old Soldiers Never Die," a British film with that title will beat home-grown products into American theaters. The English epic, starring Godfrey Tearle, will be on our screens end of this month. However, 20th-Fox will keep that tag for its flicker set to star Richard Basehart and Gary Merrill. Metro is plotting one called, "The General Came Home." Two independent plan pictures with the same theme. One company, headed by Abe Lyman and Maurice Duke, has bought rights to the old song from which Gen. MacArthur took his famous phrase, and will incorporate it into yet another film.

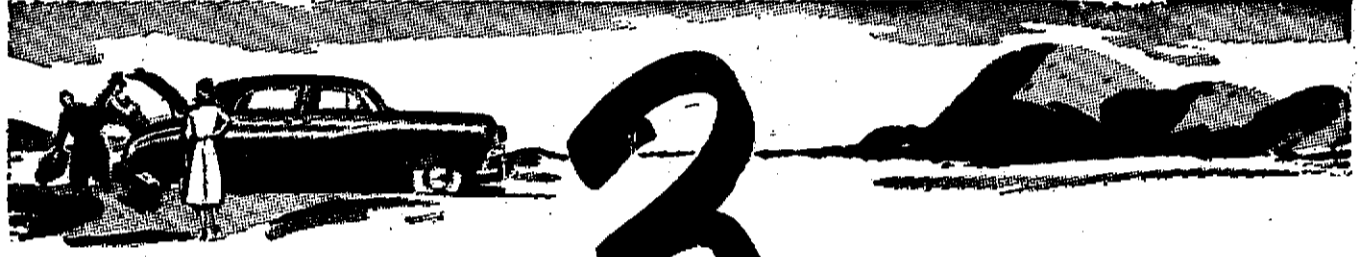

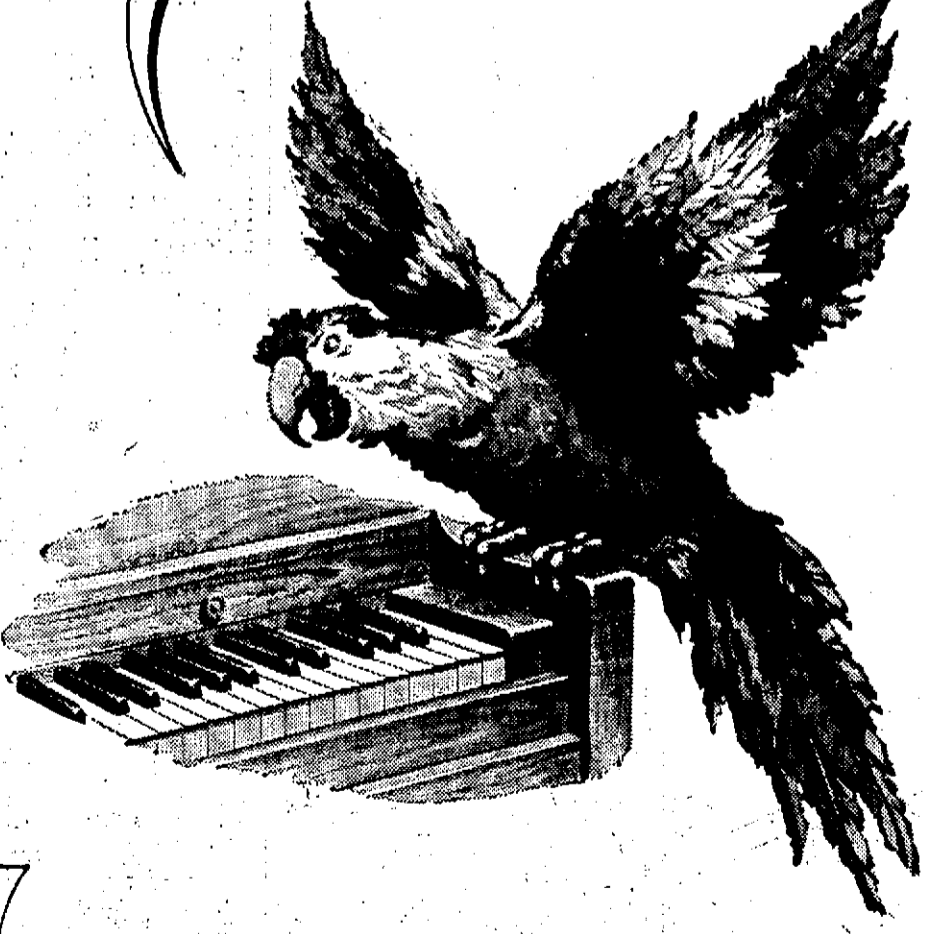
