Sponsor Sending Bergen to Entertain Servicemen

Edgar Bergen is on a three-week tour of Army and Navy camps and hospitals, accompanied by his wife, Frances, and three of their wooden-headed step-children—Charlie McCarthy, Mortimer Snerd, and Miss Effie Klinker.

Ranging from California to Texas, the tour opened with a two-day stand at Camp Stoneman, Pittsburg, Calif.

Sole purpose of the trip is entertainment of GIs, and this is believed to mark the first time that any sponsor has arranged a camp tour by its star independent of any broadcasts or telecasts.

Bergen is on his summer vacation from radio and TV, and does not return to the air (for Coca-Cola) until Oct. 7.

Bergen and family head an hour-and-a-half show which includes also a quartette, The Round-ers; a magician, Russell Swann; "Mac, Russ and Owens," comedy, novelty act, and Mary Beth Olds, acrobatic dancer.

Mrs. Bergen, a former Powers model and popular vocalist who dropped out of show business when she married the ventriloquist, is featured as a singer and also works with her husband in some of his comedy sketches with Charlie McCarthy.

Meredith Willson has been approached to do an NBC disc jockey show in New York this summer. He's in the deciding stage right now. Roy Rogers starts filming his western TV shows next month. The first six will be in black and white, the rest in color. Fibber McGee and Molly will be back in the fall, but reportedly on a reduced budget. This pairing is very predominant in most radio these days. Moolie Weaver starts his own TV show on KNBH tomorrow.

Long Beach fans of the Horace Heidt "Youth Opportunity" radio and television shows will have opportunity Sunday to hear a local youth win the radio version of the show when it is broadcast over KNX at 6:30 p. m.

Pfc. Fred S. Smith, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Smith, 1371 Roycroft Ave., won a competition held at Camp Roberts, where he is a chaplain's assistant, Wednesday night. The contest was transcribed for radio and motion pictures of it were taken for television. The television version will not be aired immediately as Heidt informed Smith he has several TV films ahead.

Pfc. Smith a tenor, is a graduate of Poly High School, where he sang one of the leads in the operetta "Sweetheart" in 1947, attended City College and sang in a choir there and in the choirs at First Presbyterian and St. Luke's Episcopal Churches. He was studying for opera when he entered the service.

Illinois Town Buys Blind Vet a Home

PERU, Ill., June 22. (AP) Joseph Kristapovich now has the deed to his home, the gift of grateful townsmen who wanted to honor a hero in their midst.

Kristapovich was blinded by an explosion aboard a minesweeper in the South Pacific in World War II. When he returned home to Peru, residents started a public campaign to buy him a home.

Five years of campaigning yielded a total of \$11,059.62. On Saturday the trustees of the fund, Clarence Charlton and John Cusick, made the final distribution that ended the trust. The blinded veteran was given the deed to his home.

Kristapovich is employed at the Westclox plant in Peru.

Will Put on File in Bonzer Estate

Mrs. Ferne W. Bonzer, widow of Arthur F. Bonzer, Long Beach Republican leader, will inherit her husband's estate under terms of a will filed for probate yesterday afternoon in Superior Court.

The petition, filed by Attorney J. F. Marshall, estimated the value of Bonzer's personal property at approximately \$10,000. In addition, considerable other property, including the Shady Acres Trailer Park here, was owned by Bonzer in joint tenancy with his wife, Marshall said.

Bonzer 56 died Monday in his home, 104 Park Ave.
