League Deplores World's Sexiness, Lists Reasons

SEATTLE — (AP) — Delegates to the Young People's Luther League convention Friday deplored "the sexiness of our environment."

The convention passed a resolution saying in part: "Alcoholism, dope addiction, sexual perversions indicate the poverty of people who are out of touch with the spiritual satisfac-

tions which only fellowship with Christ can provide. We recognize such evils as evidence that man cannot live independently of God.

"We are concerned about the more subtle intrusions of the secular search for satisfaction."

"We deplore commercial efforts to stimulate sexual excitement for financial gain. The sexiness of our environment overlooks the basic truth that those who make sex an end in itself will lose it.

"We emphasize the fact that satisfying sex experiences require a union of two people in spirit, mind and body. Such a union is possible only in Christian marriage.

"We believe that Christ alone is the key to a happy and successful Christian home. Therefore, as young people, we will seek His guidance in our preparation for life and in the choice of our life partner so that our home when established may be truly Christian."
