McCarthy Censure a 'Cooked Up' Deal, GOP Leaders Say

APPLETON (AP)—A plan to censure Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) at a picnic of his home district Young Republicans was "cooked up in advance by a group of non-members," the district chairman declared Monday.

Francis Sumnicht, Appleton, eighth district Young GOP chairman, said he was convinced Mark Hooper, Jr., Manitowish, and about 14 others "engineered ahead of time" a resolution urging McCarthy's defeat in next year's election.

Hooper, elected publicity chairman of the group at the picnic Sunday in Green Bay, announced Sunday night a resolution calling for defeat of the state's junior senator was adopted as an expression of the eighth district Young Republican organization.

"I sincerely believe that the whole thing was rigged in advance," Sumnicht said. "The picnic was Hooper's idea and the group of about 14 persons who attended with him does not hold membership cards in the Young GOP."

"Any statements made by Hooper are his own personal views and do not represent the attitude of the eighth district organization," Sumnicht said he was among the last to leave the business session of the picnic and that he did not see any "show of hands" nor hear the reading of the resolution censuring McCarthy.

"Actually," Sumnicht said Monday, "I don't think any such vote was taken. If it had been I certainly would have seen or heard it, and I didn't."

It's a long-delayed case of varicose veins that takes Frankie Laine into a hospital for surgery before the month is out.


Selena Royle has signed to play Gypsy Young's Ma in "Come Fill the Cup," the current Jimmy Cagney cinema.

Minneapolis Police Fight Battle with 4 Bandits, Nab 2

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—(AP)—Pursuing police fought a gun battle with a speeding bandit car across the length of Minneapolis Monday while residents ducked for cover.

The chase began in North Minneapolis when four bandits entered a gasoline station, slugged the attendant and fled with \$1,800. Squad cars converged on the scene and took off after the bandit car in wild chase down busy Lyndale ave.

Pedestrians scrambled for cover as slugs flew back and forth between the pursuers and the fleeing bandits. One bandit slug hit a squad car and several residents narrowly escaped being hit.

The case ended in South Minneapolis when the hold-up car was abandoned.

Officers caught two men as they tried to flee down an alley, but the other two escaped. The two captured were identified as Bruno Scordo, 39, and James E. Shoutzans, 35, both of Chicago.

The two told police they didn't know each other and didn't know the other two gunmen. Neither could they explain how they happened to be in the car.

Officers said the two captured had only a small amount of cash in their possession, and that the bulk of the loot apparently was in the hands of the two who escaped.

Giant Delphinium Bloom 65 Inches Tall Reported Here

A delphinium bloom that will top most of them—65 inches—was reported to The Wisconsin State Journal Monday afternoon by Mrs. Ernest Reed, 209 Kedzie st.

The plant is a double one with both shoots measuring 65 inches. Mrs. Reed says, but even they won't top top delphinium plants she has raised in the garden of their East side home.

"Those were so big we had to cut them down," Mrs. Reed said. "Mrs. Reed didn't measure them before they were cut, but estimated they were at least 70 inches."

And what's the secret of the giant plants? Mrs. Reed isn't sure but she thinks maybe it's the eggshells and water she uses for fertilizer.

"It's wonderful stuff," she said. "I just throw all the left-over eggshells into a can and cover them with water. Then we use the water for fertilizer."

The egg-shell water is great for house plants too, Mrs. Reed added. The only drawback is that the can with the shells should be kept covered—the odor is not very pleasant.

The large delphinium plants were purchased from the Olds Seed Co. two years ago, Mrs. Reed said. Last year, they grew to a height of about 2 feet.

Illinois Man Files Suit Here to Recover \$22,000

A complaint was filed in U. S. district court Monday by an Illinois resident, L. B. Olmstead, for recovery of \$22,000 which had been paid John T. O'Leary, Oneida county, toward the purchase of the Lakeview Motel, Minocqua.

According to the complaint, Olmstead and O'Leary purported to enter a contract for sale of the property for \$210,000 around Feb. 9 and a week later Olmstead paid the \$22,000 on the purchase price.

It pointed out that the "alleged purchase price of \$210,000 for the property represented a grossly excessive price" and that the agreement was "obtained by fraud, duress, and undue influence of the defendant," O'Leary.

Olmstead was "in such a state of intoxication" at the time the agreement was made "that he was wholly deprived of the use of his faculties, was rendered unable to comprehend and understand the nature and consequences of his acts," the complaint said.

Olmstead is represented by Atty. L. F. Schmitt, Merrill.

other install adequate sewer facilities meeting the specifications of the City of Madison Engineering Department shall have filed prior to approval of the final plat a petition with the City Clerk of the City of Madison certifying that the city for installation of sewers in the plat.

Street Grading. The subdivision shall furnish drawings which indicate a street on the plat, and after approval of those grades by the City Engineer and water utility department shall be graded the full width of the right-of-way of the proposed street. The end of the street right-of-way shall be graded to subgrade. It shall be the duty of the applicant to have the street installed and approved by the City Engineer.

Street Surfacing. After sewer and water utilities have been installed the subdivided shall surface or cause to be surfaced a 30 foot roadway in the center of each right-of-way. Said surfacing shall consist of 6 inches of crushed stone and a 2 inch coat of such surfacing has not been completed at the date the final plat is submitted for approval, the applicant shall file with the plat a bond meeting the approval of the City Engineer. The certified check, in an amount equal to 55 for each linear foot of street shown on the plat, as a guarantee that said surfacing will be completed within 90 days after approval of the plat, shall be installed and approved by the City Engineer.

The ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication.
