Stu Irwin, Wife Are Busy Making Films for Video

HOLLYWOOD—"It's horrible to be alone with yourself," said Stu Erwin when asked his reaction to watching his own TV show from the privacy of his living room.

A pair of charming people, Stu Erwin and his lovely wife June Collier Erwin, are busy at work, filming more of the highly rated, family-situation comedy films at the Hal Rosch studios in Culver City. Their schedule calls for two completed film every two days, with the average work day starting at 6:30 a. m., into making up at 7:30 with the actual shooting of scenes at 8:30. A couple of weary people, they wind up the day at 6 p. m.

Acting for June and Stu comes easily in this series of "The Stu Erwin Show," which is televised every Saturday at 7:30 p. m. from KECA-TV, as they behave in real life almost exactly as portrayed in the series, and are the parents of a son, Stu Jr., and daughter Judy.

Stu, now inactive in pictures, feels that television is the only thing, and in a few years, it will have grown up sufficiently to afford participants definite profit—one that they can count on regularly—like in the old picture days. He also feels that soon, about 75 per cent of television production will be on film, outside of sports and special events, and that major picture studios will take cognizance of this growing industry, entering into the field wholeheartedly.

"Under present conditions," Stu said, "the fluff element is pretty high because of the limited budgets causing rapid filming schedules. You don't have time to really get into the feel of the various parts."

Theater Closing Because of Video Strongly Denied

NEW YORK, July 2. (AP) Reports of television causing widespread closing of movie theaters have given an entirely erroneous impression, an official of the Council of Motion Picture Organizations says.

Arthur L. Mayer, vice president of the council, adds that there are more movie houses in the U. S. at present than ever before. Rather than declining, he says, the number has increased by 20 per cent since 1948 to 23,120 theaters.

In the same period, Mayer says, seating capacity went up 19.2 per cent to 14,684,150 seats.

Mayer asserted that most recent theater closings were due to "marginal operations" with television only one of several factors. He said his figures came from the U. S. Department of Commerce.

About 60,000,000 persons attend movies every week, Mayer said.

Famed German Surgeon Dies

BERLIN, July 2. (AP) Dr. Ferdinand Sauerbruch, famed German surgeon, died early today in a West Berlin hospital. He was 76.

Sauerbruch won wide fame for his work in plastic surgery, as a pioneer in bone transplantation and by devising new methods of amputation. His death was attributed to pneumonia.

Adolf Hitler's government in 1942 appointed Sauerbruch German army surgeon general of Berlin, a post he held until the end of World War II. He was not a member of the Nazi party and was cleared by a denazification court in 1949.

Death Takes Roos, S. F. Merchandiser

HILLSBOROUGH, July 2. (AP) Last rites for Col. Robert A. Roos, 68, president and general manager of the nine Roos Brothers stores in Northern California, will be held here today. He died at his home Saturday after a long illness.

Col. Roos served in both world wars.

Services will be at 3 p. m. conducted by Rabbi Alvin I. Fine. Entombment will be in the Home of Peace Cemetery, Colma.

Seven Service Folk Hurt in Auto Crash

SAN RAFAEL, July 2. (AP) Seven servicemen and women escaped alive but severely injured from the crumpled wreckage of their sedan after a spectacular automobile crash early Sunday.

Four airmen and three WAFs, all first-class privates, were spilled over a 50-foot area or pinned in the twisted wreckage.

Nevada Really Divorce Capital

LOS ANGELES, July 2. (AP) Nevada's claim to being the nation's divorce capital was clinched today.

The American Institute of Family Relations reported that Nevada last year had a divorce rate of 55.7 per 1000 population, nine times greater than the 6.4 rate for Florida, the runnerup.

New York had the lowest rate—0.8 per 1000. The institute based its figures on states' reports to the National Office of Vital Statistics.

Library Patrons Have Asked These Questions

Q. Is there a record for the world's longest walking tour?

A. Julio Berrisbertia, 19-year-old Venezuelan Boy Scout, left his home town, Puerto Cabello, in the fall of 1937 on a 20,000-mile walk that took him across northern South America, Central America, Mexico and 47 of the 48 states of the U. S. A. He saw President Roosevelt in Washington and gave him a letter from the president of Venezuela. His trip took four years. In that time he wore out 50 pairs of high boots. His longest one-day hike was 50 miles.

Q. Will inhaling alcohol fumes intoxicate a person?

A. Up to 62 per cent of any alcohol vapor inhaled can be absorbed into the blood stream. The remaining 38 per cent usually is exhaled and the 62 per cent absorbed by the blood is burned by the body fast enough to prevent intoxication. However, a person drinking alcohol will get drunk much faster if he is in a room with a large amount of alcohol vapor in the air.

Q. What inspired Rachmaninoff to compose his "Concerto No. 2"?

A. After the apparent failure of his first concerto, Rachmaninoff was in a state of depression and apathy and his friends' efforts to help him failed. Finally Dr. N.
