extending the reciprocal trade program. Besides Russia, Communist nations hit by the higher tariff rates are Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria, and Romania. Czechoslovakia will be affected later, once the state department decides on the necessary legal steps.

Communist exports include such items as Russian manganese, Soviet furs, Polish hams, fertilizers and coal tar products, Bulgarian tobacco, Romanian fodder and feeds, and Hungarian oilseed and meat products.

This action, announced Friday, was dictated by congress, along with another move the state department plans to take shortly banning the importation of most furs from Russia and Communist China.

What effect the removal of tariff concessions will have could not be determined immediately. Department officials generally were skeptical that there would be any great change. It was taken for granted that since the Russians have a government trade monopoly they will continue shipments, even at higher costs, if they decide they want the dollars the goods would bring.

Moreover, despite the withdrawal of concessions, the actual tariff treatment of some goods will remain the same. The reason is this: The concessions grew out of the reciprocal trade law, under which the duties on many commodities have been drastically reduced below the levels of the Smoot-Hawley tariff act of 1930.

But some goods, manganese for example, were free of duty in 1930 and are free now. Hence Russia can ship manganese on the same terms as formerly, if she so desires.

In another action, the U. S. sent two more notes demanding that Russia stop stalling on its overdue \$11,000,000 lend-lease account and return immediately 672 U. S. naval vessels loaned to the Soviets in World War II.

Congress voted for the withdrawal of trade benefits and the ban on furs by means of amendments written into the legislation.

Cash Offered for Influence, Senators Told

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Charles Bennett (D-Fla.), a campaigner for better morals in government, said Friday that persons trying to land government contracts had offered him substantial cash to help them meet "the right people."

Bennett, a deacon in the Christian church as well as a lawyer and World War II veteran, said he rebuffed the offers.

He testified before a senate ethics committee that he had received offers of cash to help them meet "the right people."

Bennett said an official restricted ment of principals of good conduct "might be the lifeline for some of our weaker brothers."

He is co-author of a house bill to set up a code of ethics.

However, a dissent was sounded by Thurman Arnold, former anti-trust chief in the justice department who now is practicing law here.

"Influence in my judgment, is a vastly oversold commodity in Washington. In the instances where it appears, it will not be curbed by a humiliating restriction placed on government employees as a whole."

Arnold said that if government service has been deteriorating one big reason is that "it is being preached against, restricted and generally kicked around that brilliant young men with other opportunities pass it by."
