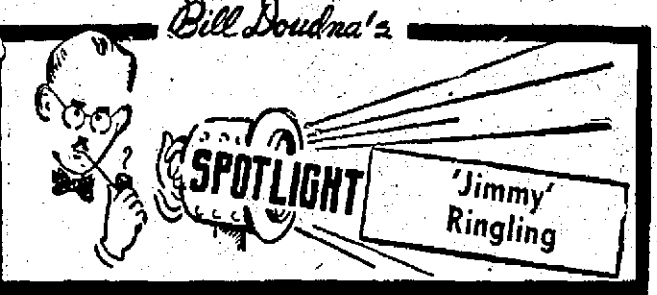
Legion Chief Warns of Conference Danger

ASHLAND — (UP) — Jerome Host, state American Legion commander, charged Tuesday night that the Korean peace talks showed "there is greater danger that Communism may triumph today than existed on June 25, 1950." He told Legionnaires at a ceremony to install Mrs. Juanita Garvin, Ashland's first lady commander of the post, that "the danger is that Communism may at the conference table—particularly at a UN conference table—win by political argument what she could not win by force of arms."
Host said the "pattern of Communist conquest" follows this scheme:
"The armistice to consider a peaceful settlement; a Communist-inspired 'bring the boys home from Korea' infiltration into the whole of Korea by the Communists; ex-

Among the men hanging circus posters in Madison store windows Tuesday was a member of the Ringling family who, since graduation from Northwestern university, has been learning show business from the ground up.

He was James "Jimmy" Ringling, son of the late Robert Ringling, chairman of the board of the Ringling Brothers-Barnum and Bailey circus at the time of his death last year.

"Jimmy's" grandfather was the late Charles Ringling, one of the five men who founded the Ringling Brothers circus at Baraboo.

This is "Jimmy's" third summer in a different circus job. Two years ago, he was on the layout crew, which prepares the showgrounds for setting up the circus, last season, he was with the cockhouse, the circus' traveling restaurant.

The Ringling-Barnum show will be in Madison on Wednesday, July 25, for two performances.

Egypt Sets Deadline for British Withdrawal

LONDON — (AP) — Egypt was reported Tuesday night to have set a deadline for withdrawal of the British garrison from the Suez canal.

Diplomatic informants said British failure to comply probably would be met by Egypt's denunciation of her 20-year defense pact with Britain.

Official circles here feared nationalistic leaders of Egypt, copying their Iranian counterparts, have decided to follow a tougher line in their dealings with Britain.

The main British argument in regard to their canal garrison is that it is essential to maintain British forces there in view of the world situation.

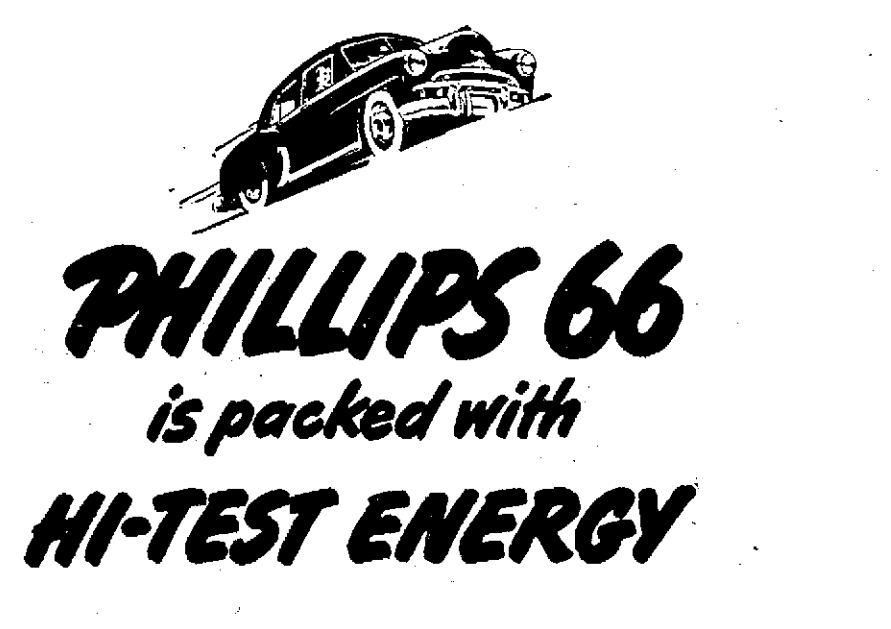
