REVOLVER SHOT FIRED TO FRIGHTEN AUTOIST

Wayman Hall, 28, of 1 Fulton court, is being held today on charges of discharging a firearm within the city limits, breach of the peace and possession of a revolver after police said he fired five shots in the air to frighten an autoist who he said had threatened him on Fulton street near Washington avenue.

Hall surrendered himself and a .38 caliber revolver at police headquarters shortly after 10:30 o'clock last night. He told police he was preparing to drive into an alleyway near his home when another autoist cut sharply in front of him. He said he left his auto and approached the other car and was threatened by the driver and four other occupants of the car.

Hall said he obtained the revolver from his home and fired the volleys to "frighten" the occupants of the car. Police said that no complaint had been received of the shooting.

Hall is being held in bonds of \$500 pending City court arraignment today.

ALFRED L. SEARLE DIES; RETIRED INSURANCE MAN

WEST HARTFORD, July 14.—(AP) Alfred L. Searle, 76, a retired insurance executive, died at his home here last night.

A native of Hartford, Searle joined the Connecticut General Life Insurance company there in 1892, upon his graduation from high school.

He rose from runner and office boy to be head of the income settlement department of the company, a post he held at his retirement, 32 years later.

Surviving are two brothers, Franklin H. Searle of Hartford, and Wilbur C. Searle of Worcester, Mass.
