

Historic Salzburg Music Fete Seeks to Regain Prewar Role

SALZBURG, Austria, July 17—(AP) With the help of American artists, the historic Salzburg Music Festival hopes this summer to regain some of its prewar greatness. The month-long feast of plays, opera and concerts starts July 27. It already is almost sold out and 80,000 music lovers from all parts of the world are expected to attend. Among them will be some 20,000 Americans.

Since the war, the supremacy of the Salzburg series has been challenged by the Edinburgh and Lucerne festivals. Another counter attraction this year is the Wagner Festival in Bayreuth, Germany.

But the 1,000-year-old city of Salzburg has planned for August a program it hopes will restore the festival's long reputation as the top summer music event in Europe.

Eight orchestral concerts by the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra are scheduled. The conductors include Leopold Stokowski, former conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, Wilhelm Furtwengler of the Berlin orchestra, and Edwin Fischer, best known as a Swiss pianist.

Rafael Kubelick, who has con-

ducted the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, will conduct a concert that includes Dvorak's Fifth Symphony, and Munich's conductor, Eugene Jochum, has been chosen to direct an all-Mozart concert in this birthplace of the composer.

The festival opens with Mozart's opera "Idomeneo"—a seldom staged early work of the composer which was given its first performance in the United States in Boston in 1848.

The opera will be under the baton of George Szell, of the Munich state opera. Jane Lawrence, an American singer who has appeared in New York concerts, will sing a leading role in the opera which is based on a Greek myth.

Mozart's "Magic Flute" will be performed four times under Furtwengler's baton.

Music lovers journeying to this city of beautiful castles, monasteries and churches, may find it hard to acquire accommodation, but festival authorities have arranged special train and bus schedules to carry visitors to outlying towns.

Festival authorities say that many of the top programs will be broadcast around the world.

Fix It Yourself

CARE OF WINDOWS

Window sashes and frames have about as rough a time of things as any other part of the house. They go through life being either half cold and half hot or half wet and half dry. It's not much of a life and they deserve more attention than they get.

First spot to go on most windows is the putty around the glass. When it begins to crack and break off, take it all off and replace it with fresh putty. Give this a day or so in which to dry and then paint. Actually, when the putty goes you should remove the glass, take out the bedding putty and replace this as well—but that's asking too much.

Small cracks and seams in the sash and window frame should be cleaned out with a sharp pointed tool and the wood checked for signs of decay. If it's perfectly sound the openings can be filled with white lead thinned down a little into a paste with turpentine. Very small cracks can be filled with thick outside paint.

Open joints and seams on the outside of the frame should be filled after cleaning, with white lead and the frame tested to make sure that it is securely attached in place. Seams between the house siding and the frame should be filled with caulking compound. The joint between the top of the frame and the house siding is usually made weather-tight with metal flashing which extends up under the siding and then comes down over the top of the frame. If there is no flashing, it's well worth installing some. Bend the metal up under the last course of siding above the frame as far as possible and then bend it down over the top of the frame. Copper is your best bet for this job, but heavy roofing paper will do and so will galvanized iron.
