War III Costs Cited in Europe Aid Plan

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Two days of World War III would match the \$2,000,000,000 cost of a year's foreign aid that would go far to head off such a conflict, Paul G. Hoffman told congress Tuesday.
 Nelson Rockefeller also supported the foreign aid program. He argued that, in addition to the immediate bearing on a tense world situation, it also is the way to hold together an American economy increasingly dependent on materials and markets abroad.
 Hoffman, former Marshall plan administrator, and Rockefeller, war-time coordinator of inter-American affairs and one-time assistant secretary of state, testified before the house foreign affairs committee.

NPA Puts Spare Tire Back on New Autos

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The spare tire is back on new autos. The National Production Authority (NPA) dropped its three-month rubber-savings ban on spares, effective Tuesday.
 It said a recent one-fifth cut-back ordered in current automobile output does away with the need for the ban.
 The ban was imposed in April with the aim of saving rubber for use in increasing production of heavy duty tires for trucks, tractors, and other farm equipment.

Woman's Body Found; Wreck Toll Rises to 4

FT. WAYNE, Ind.—(AP)—The death toll in the collision of a freight train in the collision of a freight train and a passenger train rose to four Tuesday with discovery of a woman's body under an overturned refrigerator car.
 The woman was identified as Mrs. Iley Moore, Sr., of Madison, Ill. She was riding on the Toledo-Ft. Wayne Wabash passenger train which a Nickel Plate freight struck at a crossover.
 Four passenger cars and six freight cars were wrecked and the Nickel Plate diesel locomotive was badly damaged. The tracks are nearly parallel at the crossover.
 The other dead were William C. Moore, 66, Toledo, O., a passenger, and two Wabash trainmen, H. E. "Heintz" Waggoner, 69, Danville, Ill., the conductor, and James W. Fisher, Peru, Ind.
 Thirteen persons were injured. Five were passengers and eight were railroad employes.

From spectacular "grand entry" to a thrilling trapeze finale, the Mills Brothers circus gave the fresh pleasure that is the circus business' exclusive property to two Madison audiences Tuesday.

Most of the afternoon crowd was composed of children—more than 1,000 of them—who had received free tickets from Madison civic organizations and business firms. Among them were about 100 crippled children who were guests of the Madison Shrine club, which took them to the show grounds on Royal airport by special bus.

This is the Mills show's 12th year on the road, and this was its second visit to Madison. Since that first season, it has grown greatly in size and quality; even since the brothers brought their show to town two years ago, it has become bigger and better.

While it is still small in comparison with the Ringling Brothers-Barnum and Bailey circus (which comes to Madison a week from today), the Mills Brothers circus has plenty of entertainment packed into its 90-minute performance, with several acts of outstanding quality.

Among these were the Antonettes, teeterboard and perch performers from Germany; the Rosettis of France, with their sensational revolving ladder; the Valencianos, Swiss trampoline and perch artists; Paul Nelson with his Liberty horses (10 beautiful sorrels, newly broken this season), and Joanidis, Greek juggler on the slack wire.

Principal ingredients of any circus should be thrills, skill, elephants, clowns, and horses. All were here.
 Top thrill was provided by the Rosettis, who performed on a ladder suspended horizontally above the center ring. While the male of the team stood at one end, keeping it balanced, the woman performed on the trapeze hanging from the other—and then turned the ladder into a one-woman ferris wheel through which she swung while hanging by her teeth.

The Antonettes' teeterboard act featured youthful Valentine Antonette's triple somersault through the air to a chair held by a member of the troupe.
 Other acts deserving mention were Jim Adams' Roman standing ride and work with five of the show's eight elephants; the Italian Bogino troupe's tumbling, balancing, and juggling of humans; the Wallabies, English girl turn-

\$219,102 for Lobbying Reported by Employers

Lobbyist employer financial reports filed with the secretary of state's office showed Tuesday that \$219,102 was spent by employers for lobbying activities during the recent legislative session.
 Statements of individual lobbyists were filed last week.
 The biggest employer spender was the Wisconsin Railroad assn., representing 10 railroads, which spent \$10,100, while the smallest spender was the American Brass Co., Kenosha, which spent only \$2.88.
 Some 56 firms and individuals reported no spending during the session or stated that representatives who lobbied were on the regular company payroll.
