HOLLYWOOD. It's like a three-ring circus talking to Jerry Lawrence and Bob Lee. They both sold scripts for the same radio series on WTAM, Cleveland, yet had never met.

It took New York to bring the boys together as a team, and as such, dashed off 10 scripts of varied nature, submitting them to several agencies and networks. All 10 scripts, their first team effort, were used on radio in one week! This team had a future.

They write music and lyrics, musical comedies, drama, mystery, in fact, anything there is to be written.

One of the outstanding shows these boys write is the Gordon MacRae "Railroad Hour," which enjoys the highest rating by listeners of any radio show of its nature.

ANYBODY GOT A MONSTER?

Air Force in Need of It for Picture

WASHINGTON, July 23. (AP) If you have a Gila monster digging around your backyard, get in touch with the Air Force pronto.

Lack of same is costing us taxpayers money. The flier people need one to complete a film called "The Sky Is No Limit," at Holloman Air Force Base, Alamogordo, N. M.

The Air Force is used to looking up instead of down and can't trap one of the critters whose native habitat is the desert region. Charles Hunt, busy-haired civilian who is directing the elaborate picture, said he's "suffered considerable delay" in filming the picture.

The idea of the film is to show how the Air Force handles the delicate, but important, business of guiding missiles, jets and space ships through the stratosphere.

CONTRAST SHOT
 The monster is needed for a shot to give the impression of a prehistoric demon—just for contrast.

Hunt has scoured around but can't find anybody with a handy monster. A lot of zoos have 'em. But Charlie has to tell the keeper they are apt to lose an ugly pet if they loan it for the picture.

It's supposed to slither out of the picture—p r o d e e d maybe, and likely would be smart enough not to come back.

The scene opens with a close-up of a Gila monster (or giant horned toad) and makes the little monster look like a big one. With trick camera work, it looks a little like a dinosaur. Then the monster disappears into nowhere and the cameras switch back to the sky.

The head photographer for the Air Force picture is Luigi De Angelis, who used to be an Air Force captain.

The idea of the picture is to show us downstairs folk how, with knowledge of the upper air, we can make long-range weather forecasts if the fliers go high enough and look long enough.

It depicts the inner workings of radio communications and how they can be so geared that the enemy never could intercept and figure out our system.

FILM TO KEEP SECRETS
 For security reasons, of course, the film will file away a few secrets.

A lot of universities have turned their experts loose in the program of upper-air research, although none are connected directly with this particular picture. They are University of Michigan, University of Denver, Rhode Island State College, Boston Island State College, Boston University, University of Utah, UCLA, Tufts College, Temple, and the University of Colorado.

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Library Patrons Have Asked These Questions

Q. Did Schoenberg, the composer who died this month, develop his 12-tone system of music after he came to America from Austria?
 A. No. Schoenberg did not come to the United States until 1933. As early as 1909 he was producing such works as "Five Pieces for Orchestra" and "Six Pieces for Piano," which used his radical new technique. His creative output here was great. "Ode to Napoleon," "Concerto for Piano and Orchestra" and "Fourth String Quartet" are examples.

Q. When will the next eclipse of the sun be visible in the United States?
 A. Sept. 1, 1951.

Q. Are there any radically new methods for packaging food?
 A. Eliminating air with oxygen and packaging in nitrogen will keep such foods as potato chips, roasted nuts, dry soup mixes and dehydrated foods fresh much longer. Nitrogen is harmless and tasteless and does not change the natural flavor or color of the food.

Q. How many patients are there in mental hospitals in the United States?
 A. A U. S. Census Bureau report in 1945 recorded 517,989 persons in mental hospitals for permanent psychiatric care at the end of that year. This represents 371 persons out of every 100,000 in the population. This figure does not take into account psychiatric facilities in general hospitals, station hospitals of the armed forces or psychopathic hospitals.

Q. What was the date of the last Indian uprising in the United States?
 A. The Leech Lake uprising in northern Minnesota, Oct. 5 to 7, 1898.

Q. What do the letters NKVD mean?
 A. This is the abbreviation for the term used for the Peoples' Commissariat for Internal Affairs in the USSR. The letters stand for the telescoped word "Narkomvnutdel" from Narodni Kommissariat Vnutrevnih Del.
