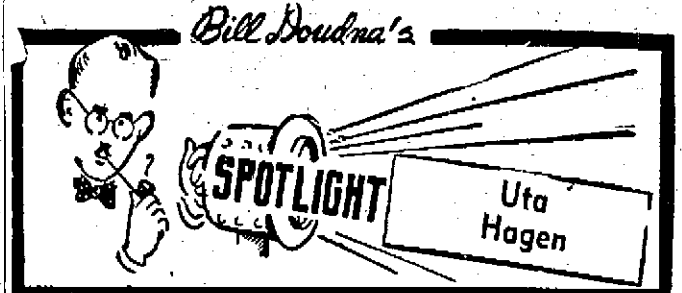

In the musical division, the honors went to Yul Brynner of "The King and I" and Shirley Booth of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn."

Everyone active in the Broadway theater last season, from stage hands to producers, was eligible to vote in the poll conducted by the Billboard, theatrical trade paper. The awards were named for the weekly's founder.

Other citations in the two divisions included:

Best plays, "Darkness at Noon" and "Guys and Dolls."

Best direction, Daniel Mann of "The Rose Tattoo" and George S. Kaufman of "Guys and Dolls."

Best supporting performances, Eli Wallach and Phyllis Love of "Call Me Madam," and Dorraita Morrow of "The King and I."

Best debut performances, Denholm Elliott of "Ring Around the Moon," Dominique Blancart of "L'Ecôle des Femmes," and Robert Aida and Vivian Blaine of "Guys and Dolls."
