Song-Writing Team Plans Great Rail Hour Series

HOLLYWOOD. That writing team of Lawrence and Lee have been burning the well known midnight oil and have come up with the themes and scripts for the balance of the summer series for the Railroad Hour, a favorite, starring Gordon MacRae.

This coming Monday, they do "The Story of Gilbert & Sullivan," with the story scripted by the team of L. & L. Music, of course, will be by Gilbert and Sullivan, but expect to hear a different twist as only these boys can twist it. On Aug. 6, a story of "The Big Top" will be aired, combining the thrill and excitement of a circus in the script, with music of the same flavor.

For the broadcast of Aug. 13, they title the story "1001 Nights" with the music by Rimsky-Korsakov. L. & L. feel that this one is another of their "New American Light Opera Efforts," and they jokingly refer to the scripting as "a story of a Bagdad traveling salesman." From the book "Marjorie Daw," the show for Aug. 20 is based. Here they alter the show, but use familiar old-time music in the theme. Title is "Long Ago."

A famous Irish legend, "Danny Freck" will be aired on Aug. 27, making use of old time Irish music, filtered through their original script. Some of L. & L.'s original music will creep into the broadcast of Sept. 3, as they put together a Mark Twain story of "Innocents Abroad," and the same goes for the airing of the 10th, during the story of Marco Polo.

A story that has never been made into a musical before, "Rip Van Winkle," will burst forth with original music, as Lawrence and Lee write this one in the hopes of it becoming another New American Light Opera, on Sept. 17. The final show of this series will air on Sept. 24, with the story, "The Heavenly Cook."

NEWS OF THE ARMED SERVICES

Sons of Officers May Get a Break

A bill which authorizes the appointment of 50 sons of regular officers to the military and naval academies each year has been introduced in Congress by Rep. Frank Smith (D-Miss.). Sons of officers of the regular services are now at a disadvantage in obtaining appointments to the academies, Rep. Smith told the press.

"They are less likely to have the contacts with Congressmen," Smith pointed out.

Regular officers move more frequently than civilians and are necessarily restrained in talking part in political life.

Under the proposal the superintendents of each academy would be authorized to accept applications each year from regular officers' sons, to set up regulations for selection and to name the 50 additional cadets and 50 additional midshipmen on the basis of order of merit after competitive examinations.

Chief Bos'n's Cris S. Evans, USN, who has been stationed at the Naval Ammunition and Net Depot, Seal Beach, has received orders to the Commander, San Francisco Group, Pacific Reserve Fleet, for duties with the reactivation of the battleship Iowa.

Lt. Comdr. William M. Edwards has received orders to Third Marine Brigade, Camp Pendleton.
