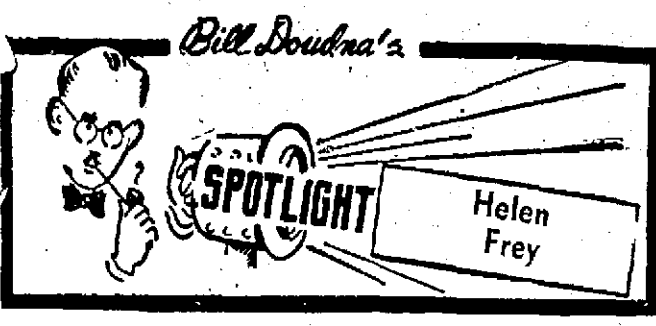

Two City Policemen Allowed to Keep Cash Merit Awards

The Madison police pension board voted unanimously Monday to permit retention of cash merit awards by Officers Norman Wright and William Watry.

Wright was given first place and Watry second by the meritorious award committee at the annual meeting of the Wisconsin Police Protective Assn. convention in May for risking their lives in attempts to save drowning victims at Madison parks last summer.

Wright, who leaped into the locks at Tenney park in a futile effort to save Ronald Stout and Anthony DeGregory, received a \$50 cash award while Watry, who made a similar attempt to rescue a Janesville boy at Wingra locks, received \$25. Both also were awarded plaques as evidence of their heroism.

But a letter from Ralph Hornbeck, president of the Madison Police Protective Assn. informed the board Monday that the cash awards, by statute, must be turned over to the pension fund unless the pension board, by resolution, grants the recipients permission to retain them.

The police protective association's executive committee has approved retention of the awards by Wright and Watry as an incentive to other officers, Hornbeck reported.

No precedent would be set, as the same privilege was granted Madison award recipients two years ago, but the men have a better argument which was not mentioned in Hornbeck's letter, said Inspector Phil Oakley, who moved that Wright and Watry be allowed to keep their cash.

Both are now under the state retirement system and never can benefit from the police pension fund, he explained.

Chief Bruce Weatherly seconded his motion.

Shorewood Annexation Petitions Expected Soon

Circulation of petitions for annexation of the village of Shorewood Hills among property owners in a six-block strip of the town of Madison between University ave. and the Milwaukee railroad tracks is expected to begin in about three weeks, according to residents of the area and Shorewood officials.

Notice of intention to circulate annexation petitions was filed last week by residents of the area. Laws require that petitions be circulated after 30 and before 45 days after notice is filed.

The village board can make the annexation effective by approving the petition when it is presented to the board. The town of Madison, of which the area is now a part, does not take any part in the action.

Most residents of the area, valued at over \$1,000,000, have indicated that they approve the annexation. Largest properties in the strip, now bounded by Shorewood and the city of Madison, are the Timlin Lumber Co., the Shorewood Shopping Center now under construction, and the Coca-Cola bottling plant.
