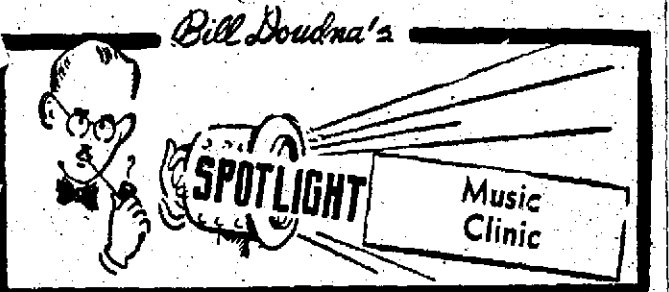

Forty-one high school pupils attending the chorus and orchestra section of the University of Wisconsin music clinic are here on full or partial scholarships. About 200 boys and girls are enrolled in the All-State chorus and All-State orchestra—120 in the former and 104 in the latter, with some of them in both organizations.

Many of the young musicians have been sent here on scholarships from their respective high schools. Others have come with all or part of their expenses paid by music groups and civic clubs.

Two have come on Wisconsin School Music Assn. scholarships which they won in spring festivals in Madison and Wausau. They are Myrna Lewis, Dodgeville, and Molly Hanson, Hayward.

Schools and organizations sponsoring pupils include the Ashland high school orchestra and choir; Ashland Band and Orchestra Mothers; Chippewa Falls high school; MacDowell club of Janesville; Kiwanis, Lions, and South Milwaukee high school chorus; Neokosa Band Mothers; Wisconsin Rapids Kiwanis club and Barber-shoppers; Wauwatosa Band and Orchestra Mothers; Whitefish Bay Music Parents Assn. (eight pupils); Band and Orchestra Mothers of Wisconsin Rapids, and Music Mothers of Elgin, Ill., high school (six pupils).

Seven states besides Wisconsin are represented in the clinic. Pupils from out of the state live in Danville, Elgin, Freeport, Maywood, and Elmwood Park, Ill.; Evansville, Indianapolis, and Valparaiso, Ind.; Debuque, Ia.; Le Sueur, Minn.; North Kansas City, Mo.; Chidnamit and Wooster, O., and Erie, Pa.

Green Bay Estate Gets Chance to Appeal Tax. MILWAUKEE — (AP) — The estate of Nathan Rosenberg, Green Bay businessman, will have an opportunity to appeal a \$1,920,488 federal tax claim, a United States attorney said Tuesday.

U. S. District Judge Robert E. Tahan declined Monday to grant counsel for the Rosenberg estate a restraining order which would have prevented the government from acting on its claim.

The claim is for alleged unpaid income taxes and fraud penalties for 1942 through 1945.

Meyer Cohen, attorney for the estate, said he could not take the matter to the United States tax court because the government had not presented the defendants with a 90 day notice of assessment.

Ellis Hayes, assistant U. S. attorney, said the notice (90 day letter) would be served within a week. Judge Tahan decided that would give Cohen time to file an appeal against the assessment in tax court.

State Department Names Jones, U.W. Grad, Berlin Chief

Howard P. Jones, University of Wisconsin alumnus and well known director of the U. S. Berlin, Germany, element, the state department has announced.

Woman Faces Court Here for 'Bad Checks'

The middle-aged woman arrested at Rio two weeks ago as Hazel Baker, wanted in Lansing, Mich., and New Haven, Conn., on "bad check" charges, will be arraigned in federal court here Aug. 13, U. S. Atty. Thomas Fairchild announced Tuesday.

Both indictments, from Lansing and New Haven, have been transferred to Madison for disposition before Judge Patrick T. Stone, Fairchild said.

The woman, also said to be known as Hazel Green and Hazel Wheeler, has been in Dane county jail, in default of \$2,500 bond, since her preliminary hearing before U. S. Commissioner J. J. McManamy July 20.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The house postoffice committee tentatively approved Tuesday a \$400 annual pay raise for salaried postal workers.

Thomson Turns Down State Pay Court Test

Atty. Gen. Vernon Thomson Thursday refused a Milwaukee attorney's request to ask the state supreme court to rule on the constitutionality of a law raising salaries of state officials.

Thomson told Henry S. Reuss that he advised the legislature last Apr. 10 that the measure was constitutional.

"You have presented no reason which would justify a change of the opinion," Thomson wrote Reuss. The attorney general said he also told Secretary of State Fred Zimmerman that if a test suit were started he would "defend the constitutionality of the statute."

Thomson told Reuss that he still will defend the law if the matter comes to a court test.

Reuss asked for a court test on grounds the "sole purpose" of the law was to evade a provision in the constitution which said that salaries of public officers could not be increased during their term of office.

Hold on to Corn, U.W. Expert Says

Farmers are advised to hold on to their corn this year. That's the suggestion from P. E. McNall, agricultural economist at the University of Wisconsin.

This year's corn crop has started slow, and good stands are rare. Unless a lot more hot days and warm nights are on the state's weather menu, corn yields will be low. Corn supplies this fall will be short, and more may have to be shipped into the state.

But small grains are a different story, McNall said. Forecasts of high yields in small grains this year indicate large supplies on hand for feeding.

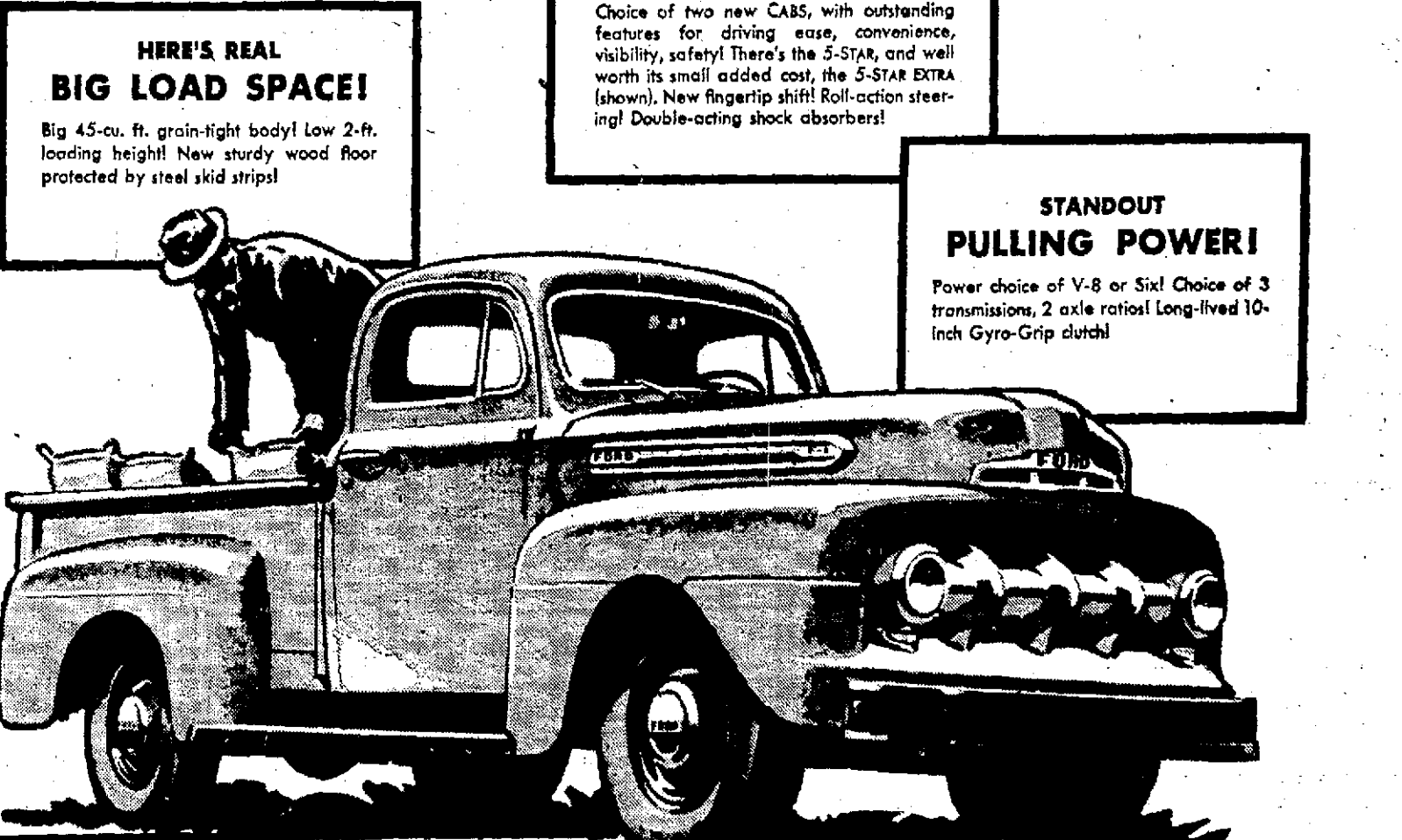
P. W. Dunnewald Estate Estimated at \$42,000
