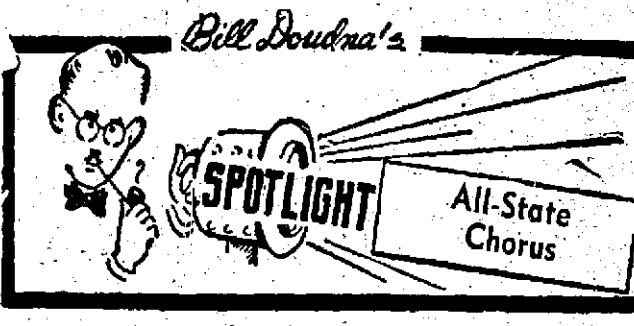

After only eight days together, the 120 boys and girls who make up the All-State high school chorus sang like veterans Wednesday when they gave the Rotary club a sample of their work.

Under the direction of J. Russell Paxton, these youngsters have developed, since they began rehearsals July 23, into a spirited and well-polished choral group. They came to Madison from all parts of Wisconsin and from neighboring states to attend the chorus and orchestra session of the University of Wisconsin music clinic.

For the Rotarians, the chorus sang a half-dozen numbers, from the reverent "Cherubim Song No. 6" of Tschaiikowsky, with its ringing climaxes, to the happy Youmans tune, "Great Day."

The applauding club members wanted more, but Paxton had to tell them that the chorus had prepared no encores.

The other numbers were Benjamin Britten's "Deo Gratias," William's free-swinging arrangement of "Joshu Fit de Battle of Jericho," Aschenbrenner's version of "Ica's Castle," an eight-part Czech round and William Schuman's "The Orchestra," a highly descriptive piece based on an Australian folk song.

The chorus and the All-State orchestra will give their annual concert at 8 p. m. Sunday, Aug. 12, in the Wisconsin Union theater.

Supplying musical entertainment will be a four-man orchestra and an all-girl chorus.

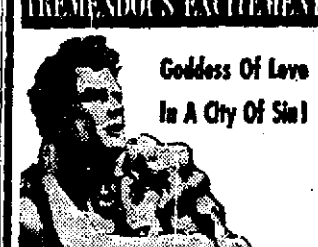
