### Tax Investigators Plan Drive on Beer, Liquor Law Violators

Changes in laws on the sale of beer and liquor by the 1951 legislature were discussed at a conference of state beverage and cigarette tax division investigators recently.

Investigators were instructed to make arrests immediately when they find violations of liquor and beer laws applying to minors.

A beer or liquor licensee violating the minor law is subject to a fine of up to \$250 plus costs or imprisonment in the county jail for up to 60 days. A minor violating the laws may be fined \$20 and costs or be imprisoned up to 30 days.

Principal change in the new law is the restriction on entering and remaining in a tavern where beer is sold. The restriction includes the entire premises of the tavern for anyone under 18 not accompanied by parent or guardian.

The new laws prohibit minors under 18, when not accompanied by parent or guardian, from entering or being in any room in a beer tavern whether or not beer is served in the room. The laws except bona fide business purposes, which do not include amusement, buying, or consuming food or beverages.

The same change was made in the liquor law to apply to minors under 21.

The old beer law permitted minors to enter a tavern for bona fide business, including purchase of food or beverages for consumption off the premises. It also permitted minors to remain in a room in which no beer was sold, served, or dispensed.

The new laws provide that no person under 21 is eligible for a bartender's license or retail liquor license.

### Truman Signs Pension Law for Old Veterans

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Pres. Truman Saturday signed legislation standardizing pension rates for veterans, or their widows, of the Spanish-American war, Philippine insurrection and the Boxer rebellion.

The new rates range from \$60 to \$120 monthly depending on qualification. About 900 persons are affected and will get small increases.

Relax with Iced Coffee or Iced Tea

Here's how to get the best in iced coffee and iced tea

As suggested by Beth Merriman

Relax over tall, frosty glasses! Whether iced coffee or iced tea, the secret is in strength at the start. For pre-cooled, brewed iced coffee make it regular strength (1 Standard Coffee Measure or 2 level measuring tablespoons coffee to each ¾ measuring cup of water.) Cool in non-metallic container not more than 3 hours. Serve in tall glasses with ice. Or, make coffee double-strength by using half the usual amount of water. Pour hot into ice-filled glasses. More ice is needed, but this is our favorite method for brewed iced coffee.

- For instant iced coffee, place 1 heaping regular teaspoon instant coffee in glass. Dissolve in small amount of hot water, preferably boiling. Partly fill glass with cool water. Add ice.
- For brewed iced tea, preheat pot. Pour measured boiling water over tea (2 tsp. tea or 2 teabags to 1 measuring cup water). Let steep 3 to 5 minutes. Pour over ice in tall glasses. For instant iced tea, place 1 rounded teaspoon instant tea in glass, dissolve in a little hot water; add cool water and ice.
