Taft Warns U. S. to Face Question of Spending Limit

WASHINGTON — (UP) — Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-O.) said Sunday that Americans must face up soon to the issue of "how much can we stand" in the way of military spending at home and abroad. Taft's statement, coupled with his warning that this country next year will have to consider a possible federal sales tax, came as senate committees were studying how much of the nation's over-all product can be devoted to defense preparations.

The Republican senate policy chief told a reporter the big question of how much of the nation's output can be devoted to military purposes far overshadows the now pending question of whether the big \$5,500,000,000 foreign arms and economic aid bill can be reduced. "What I am most concerned about," Taft said, "is the total amount of military spending — at home and for arms and abroad — rather than how much we are going to spend for Europe."

Chairman Tom Connally (D-Tex.) of the senate foreign relations committee, meanwhile, differed sharply with a suggestion that "at least" \$2,000,000,000 be trimmed from the foreign aid bill. The cut was proposed by Sen. Walter F. George (D-Ga.), a ranking member of Connally's committee.

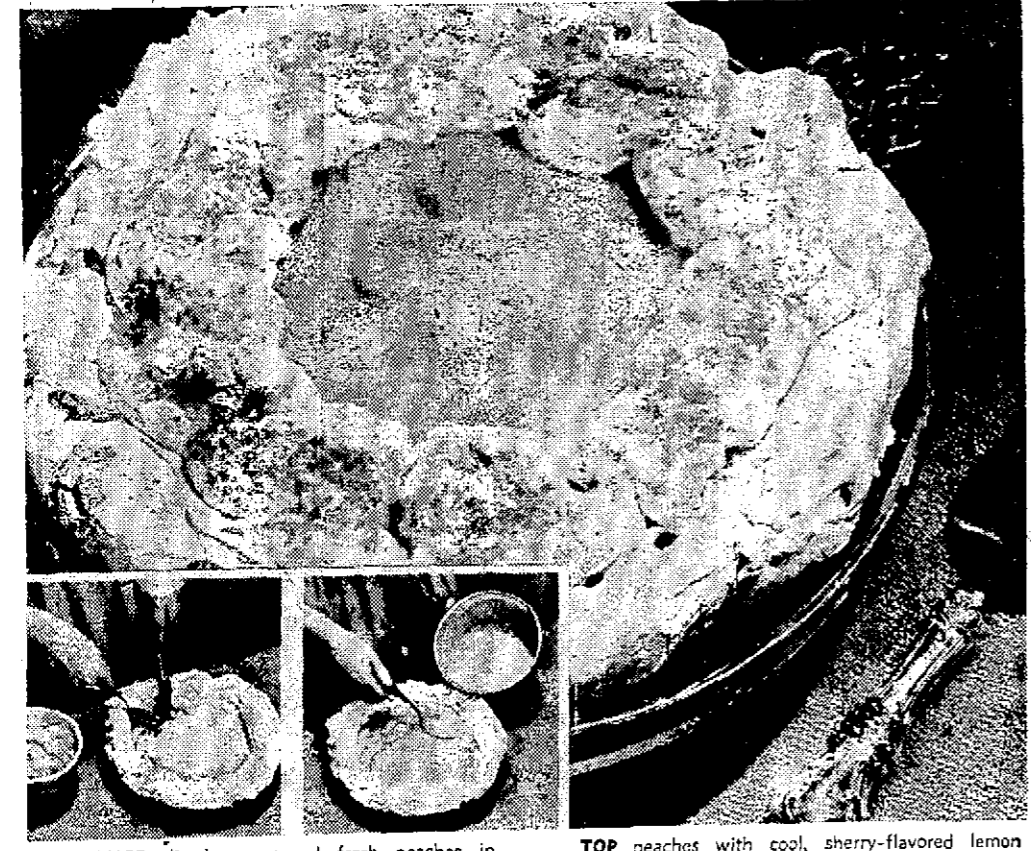
2 New Gases Found In Earth's Atmosphere

COLUMBUS, O. — (UP) — Presence of two new gases in the earth's atmosphere, both of which form, have been discovered through studies of the sun's energy by Ohio State university scientists.

The university disclosed Sunday that research on the sun's infrared radiation revealed for the first time that the atmosphere contains carbon monoxide and methane. The work also confirmed earlier findings that another gas, nitrous oxide, is a permanent part of the atmosphere. Ohio State physicists and astronomers said that although the gases in concentrated form would be injurious, they exist above the earth in such small quantities as to have no physiological effects. Still to be determined is how the substances are formed and distributed in the atmosphere.
