TV's Ideal Family Man Is No Real Life Father

HOLLYWOOD—Charlie Ruggles, the man most people think of as a great family man in real life because of his excellent ability to portray the characterizations, never has been a father! Yet, according to Charlie, "The Ruggles" cast as Twisted on KECA-TV every Thursday at 7 p. m., as a family, does everything but live together. People playing the parts on this show seem to have completely lost their identity. As an example, Erin O'Brien Moore, who plays the part of Mrs. Ruggles on the television, when marketing, or seen on the street, is not addressed as Moore, but as "Mrs. Ruggles." Charlie is constantly asked about the well-being of his "son" while the public insists on making a real life family out of this group. Ruggles, an old-timer in the acting field, had no family in the background. His father wanted him to become a doctor, but the training with scalpel and sutures was not appealing to young Charlie. One day in San Francisco, he met a young fellow in the acting business who was making in one week, more money than Charlie made in a month.

"Right then and there," Ruggles said, "I decided that's where I wanted to be."
A bit on the unusual side is the fact that Charlie was given lines to read from his very first acting job. He was a character actor at the age of 17, and didn't come into younger parts as a juvenile until eight years later, a practice quite common in the old days.
When Charlie first hit the movies, he was cast as a drunk, a part that he played for several years, later being cast as a family man. "I like this type of role," he said, "and will probably never get away from it."
Every television show of "The Ruggles" is like an opening night to Charlie, who is one of TV's most enthusiastic boosters, a point well proved by the warmth and smoothness of this family situation type program.

Let's Explore Your Mind

1. HAVE SCIENTISTS DONE ALL THEY COULD TO SHOW MAN THE SPIRITUAL VALUES?

2. WHAT BOOK OF THE BIBLE GIVES A GOOD PICTURE OF A NEUROTIC?

3. ARE MARRIED COUPLES HAPPIER WHEN BOTH ARE EMPLOYED?

Answers to Questions No. 1, 2, and 3.

1. Yes. Since the divorce rate is much higher among couples of leisure than among working couples or couples in which only the father works, that seems to answer the question. Too much leisure does not make for happiness of any kind. Even with children, the marriage is more likely to be happy when both sexes have congenial work. However, over three-fourths of marriages are happy anyhow.

2. No. They have enlarged the infinity within man and the infinity without, but they have done little to show the average man the possibilities of a richer, more meaningful religious life. As a consequence, people flock to mystics, mediums, star gazers, pseudo-psychanalysts.

3. Scientists have done little to bring the common man into the world of spiritual values that they themselves know.

4. Biblical scholars tell me the Book of Job is a "drama of the inner life." They say the various characters represent the warring selves in man's nature—the good and bad, the intelligent and foolish—fighting for supremacy. During one period Job was a neurotic. Finally, when his distracted soul repents over the unworthy self to which he had temporarily yielded, he comes to a great peace of mind and unity of life.
