Youth, 20, Fined \$50 for Entering Park St. Tavern

Eugene V. Fairclough, 20, of 450 W. Gilman st., paid a \$50 fine in superior court Monday for entering the Golden Pheasant tavern, 2109 S. Park st., a week ago without being 21 years old.
 This year's legislature passed a new law which provides that minors and tavern owners are liable for minors merely entering taverns, and no loitering by minors has to be shown as required by the previous law.
 Mrs. Elizabeth Burgett, operator of the Golden Pheasant, is scheduled to be arraigned in superior court today on charges of permitting Fairclough to enter the tavern.
 Fairclough was involved in a fight at the tavern Aug. 10, for which he forfeited \$25 bail on disorderly conduct charges in superior court last week.

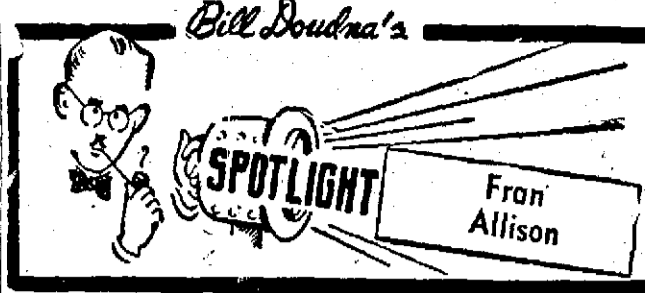

Maj. Holohan's Body Brought Back from Italy

NEW YORK (AP)—The body of Maj. William V. Holohan, victim of a mysterious cloak-and-dagger slaying in wartime Italy, was brought home Monday after seven years.
 The bronze casket was lowered from a navy transport to a flag-draped pier at the Brooklyn army base.
 Funeral services are scheduled next Monday at St. Patrick's cathedral.
 Holohan's brother, a Wall street broker, was not on hand. He had helped bring the mystery to public attention. He reportedly was away for a week.
 Two of Maj. Holohan's American comrades in an Office of Strategic Services (OSS) behind-the-lines mission are accused by the defense department of helping slay Holohan.
 The two accused men, Aldo Icaro di Pittsburgh and Carl LeDolce of Rochester, N. Y., have denied any part in the slaying.

An anxious reader wants to know whether Fran Allison, the singer; "Fran," of "Kukla, Fran, and Ollie," and "Aunt Fanny," of Don McNeill's "Breakfast Club" are all the same Fran Allison.
 The answer is "yes."
 Miss Allison was born in LaPorte City, Ia., and attended Coe college at Cedar Rapids, and she sang in the glee club. In school—where she studied to be a teacher—she decided to sing professionally.
 So what happened when she graduated? She got a job as a teacher, which she held four years.
 One day Fran auditioned at a station in Waterloo, Ia., and became a radio singer, specializing in old ballads. If it hadn't been for a waggish announcer she might still be doing just that.
 But one day this announcer interrupted a news broadcast as she entered the studio, remarking: "Why, here comes Aunt Fanny. Step up to the microphone and speak to the folks."
 Fran stepped up, and for five minutes she chattered away like a small-town gossip. Listeners loved it, and she made the character a regular one.
 Three years later she was in Chicago starting shows called "The Jamboree," "The Smile Parade," and "Meet the Meeks." Soon she was a regular on McNeill's "Breakfast Club."
 In 1947, she joined Burr Tillstrom's "Kukla" and "Ollie" for their television debut in a program called "Junior Jamboree." After a few months, the title was changed to "Kukla, Fran, and Ollie," and Miss Allison was a full-time member.
 Tall and slim, Miss Allison is reputed to be an expert cook and a mystery-story fan. In 1941, she was married to Archie Levington, former infantry lieutenant who now represents a music publishing firm.

40 Oregon Convicts Eat; 1,300 Still Won't Work

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Thirteen hundred convicts were hungry in Oregon's state penitentiary Monday rather than capitulate to the warden's no work-no eat edict.
 Forty trustees gave in Monday after five days without food and sent word they were ready to give up their part of a prison strike which started last Tuesday.
 But the vast majority of convicts continued to defy Warden George Alexander's order and stayed in their cell blocks without food.
 When the 40 trustees—mostly cooks, truck drivers, and gardeners—sent in word with a guard that they were ready to go to work, Alexander ordered breakfast for them.
 But the 1310 others let the noon meal go by, the 13th they have missed since the warden's order became effective Thursday.
