'Voice' Funds Receive Boost

Senate Unit Votes \$63 Million Total
WASHINGTON—(P)—Rejecting a plea by Pres. Truman for nearly twice as much, the senate appropriations committee voted 14 to 9 Tuesday to give the "Voice of America" \$63,000,000 to operate this year.
Mr. Truman asked congress Monday to restore the full \$115,000,000 he had requested in the budget in January, contending there must be no slackening of the psychological warfare against Communism.
The house previously had cut the amount to \$85,000,000 and a senate appropriations subcommittee had reduced it further to \$56,000,000.
However, Sen. Pat McCarran (D-Nev.), chairman of the subcommittee, moved Tuesday to make the amount \$63,000,000 because the state department agency, which operates the short wave foreign-beamed radio, already had been spending at last year's appropriation rates under continuing bills passed by congress.

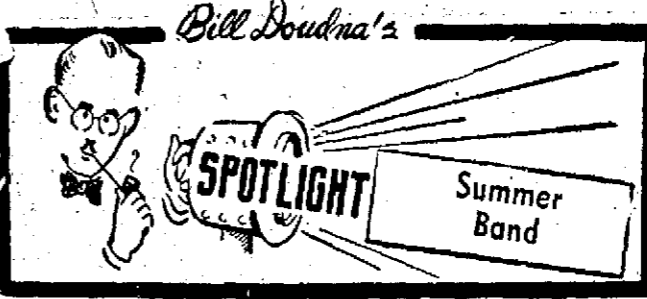

U. S. Meat Production Moves Above '51 Level

WASHINGTON—(P)—Meat production has moved above last year's level for the first time since early July, the agriculture department reported Tuesday.
Production by federally-inspected slaughterers was reported at 279,000,000 pounds last week compared with 268,000,000 in the corresponding week last year.
Total meat production since the first of the year has been slightly below that in the same period last year. It is expected, however, to run ahead of last year for much of the remainder of this year, reflecting an increase in live stock production.

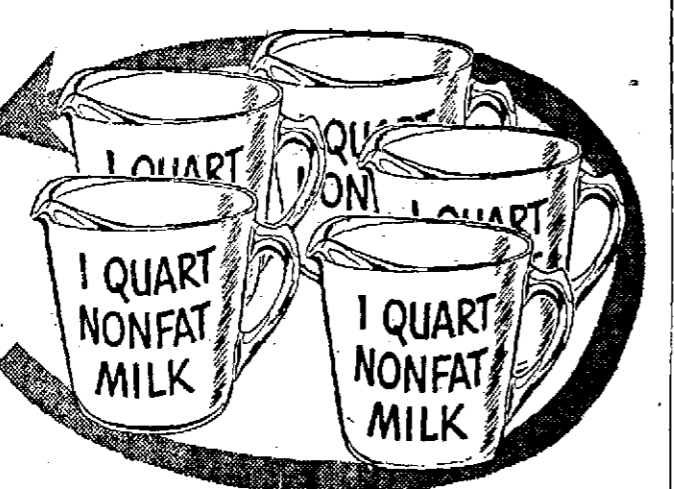

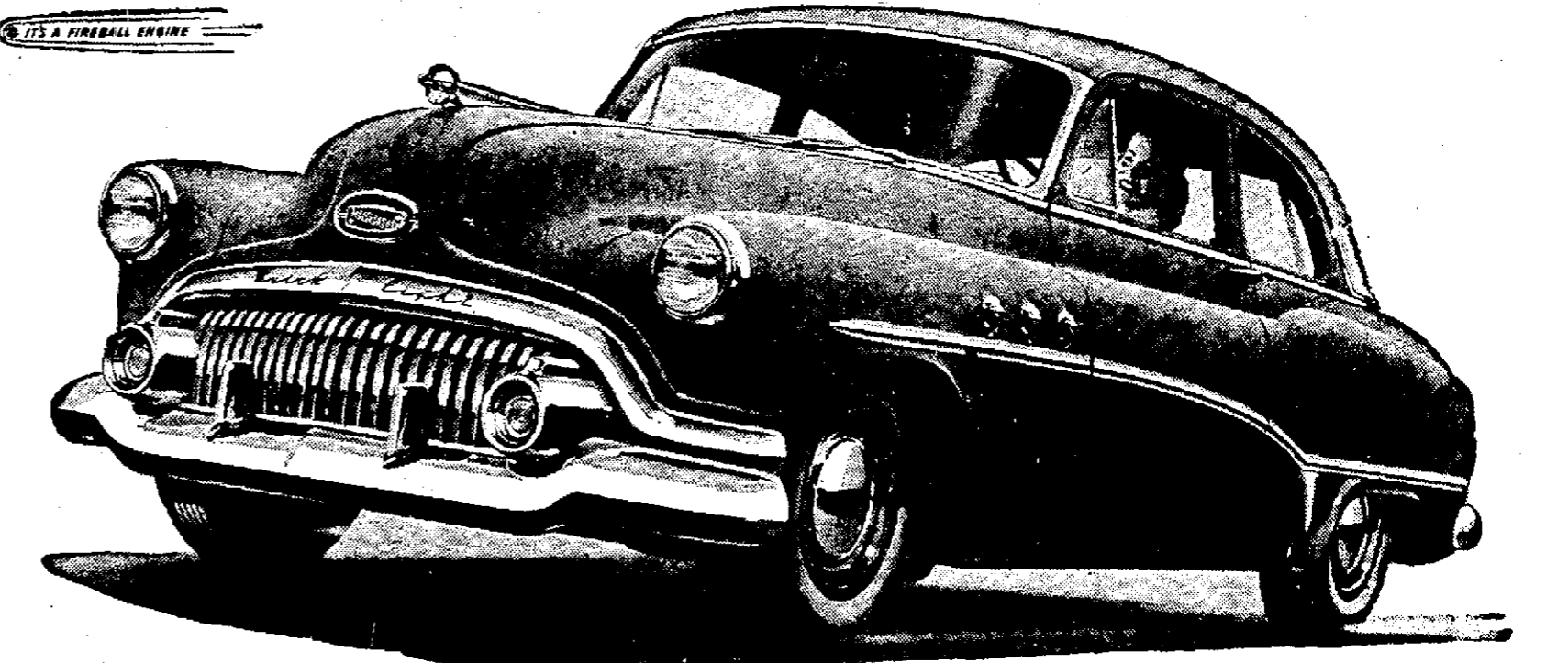
