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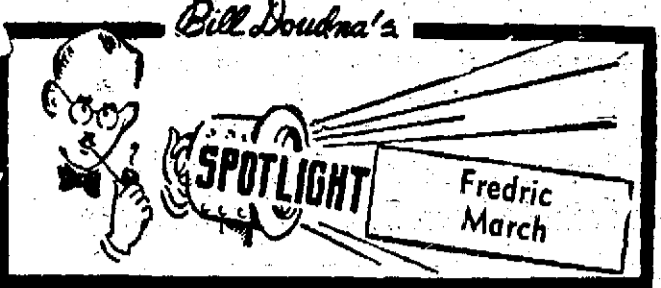
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TIP O' THE MORNING: Watch for radio and movies to start whirlwind campaigns—separately, of course—to fight off television threats.

Big Hurricane Heads for Hills

MEXICO CITY, (UP)—Hurricane "Charlie" whirled into the mountains of Mexico to die Thursday, concealing its path and extent of new damages by snuffing out communications along the way.

The storm, which has taken at least 154 lives in a week-long rampage of 13,000 miles from Jamaica to Mexico, left the battered oil port of Tampico with at least three dead, hundreds of injured, and a communications blackout.

'Quiet' in Tampico
The U. S. weather bureau in Washington said the storm now will probably "beat itself out" against the Mexican mountains.

An emergency radio message received here from Tampico airport said "it is quiet in Tampico now."

But winds of 30 to 45 miles an hour still were whipping the city and heavy rain was falling for the third straight day, adding to the flood damage.

The thrashing tropical storm west of Tampico, its winds had diminished from the 130-miles-an-hour pace over Tampico but its center still was believed to be moving along at 10 to 15 miles an hour.

Pair Electrocuted
Before the last telephone line from Tampico was blacked out Wednesday night, a correspondent reported from Tampico that the city's 90,000 residents were without a water supply.

The danger of fire and electrocutions from downed power lines was so great that the city shut off all light and power.

One woman and her year-old son were electrocuted when they stepped on a fallen wire that had blown into the city's rain drenched streets. Another woman died of exposure after she had been evacuated from her flooded home.

When the big storm hit Jamaica island in the Caribbean last Friday, 148 persons were killed. Another died on Mexico's Yucatan peninsula and two men were drowned by the huge waves off the Texas coast.

Hundreds of Tampico residents, including Gov. Horacio Teran, were injured by flying debris at the height of the storm.

3 Escapees, 16, Held for Series of Breakins

MARINETTE (AP)—Three 16-year old boys, two of them escapees from the Waukesha School for Boys, were being held in the Marinette county jail Thursday in connection with a series of break-ins.

Officers said the boys admitted burglarizing a home Sunday of \$200 and breaking into a tavern and a grocery Friday night and escaping with lesser amounts. Formal charges were expected to be filed Friday. The trio was arrested by city police Wednesday.

The two reportedly escaped from the Waukesha school Aug. 16.
