Answer to Question No. 1: No. Paul H. and Judson T. Lewis, in their book "Social Living," point out that teenagers should look upon dating merely as an opportunity for growing up socially and emotionally through friendships with members of the opposite sex. When they begin to regard dating as a game of love and romance, they miss the deeper happiness. They should make lasting friendships with many of the opposite sex with a view to wise mate selection in the future.

Answer to Question No. 2: No. Almost no effort is made in schools to teach children the greatest art of life — how to talk clearly, effectively and with a well modulated voice. Iowa University psychologist Wendell Johnson shows that a speech defective is the largest group of handicapped children in America, yet almost no effort is made to help them. Stuttering is a terrible handicap, but it is often curable if a clinic is sought early. Most colleges and universities have a speech clinic.

Answer to Question No. 3: No. He can be "rehabilitated" and can usually stop drinking, but once an alcoholic always an alcoholic. If you can't stop after one drink or need one or two drinks the next morning, you are an alcoholic. You may swear off for a year or so, but after one drink, you go overboard again. First, join Alcoholics Anonymous. Second, see a doctor, psychiatrist or psychologist who understands alcoholism. # President Truman's Office Duplicated for TV Series

HOLLYWOOD—During a very pleasant two hours spent with Edward Arnold, nowadays better known as "Mr. President," the subject of a television show based on this same series was discussed. In the course of conversation, Arnold told about the projected plans for the TV series and a few of the problems entailed. "For the sake of authenticity," Arnold said, "the producers wanted me to get some interior pictures and measurements of the President's office in Washington, knowing that I am a personal friend of Harry Truman."

Arnold called Matt Connelly, appointment secretary to President Truman, and asked about the possibility of taking pictures of the office and also getting accurate room measurements, to create a television set for the proposed series.

A few moments later, Arnold heard the voice of President Truman on the line saying, "Hello, Mr. President," to which he replied, "Hello, Mr. President" and shortly, the arrangements were completed.

Arnold is co-founder with Ben Neal, of "I Am an American Day," using his own time and money to get this day set up in bill form; it was while working on this, that Arnold became friendly with President Truman, who at that time, headed the special committee to investigate the national defense program. Although Arnold was jokingly accused of lobbying the bill, it passed the House and Senate in record time of 36 hours, and is now a national holiday.

The terrific performance turned in by Edward Arnold on his recent TV guest appearance during "What's My Line," should make the TV networks open their eyes and hurry up the debut of this great star on their medium.

As far as it is known, Edward Arnold is the first actor to receive an honorary doctor's degree from an accredited university.

## Sees Most Video Shows on Film

Everett Crosby, president of his brother's Bing Crosby Enterprises, estimates that 75 per cent of television programs ultimately will be on film.

Crosby predicts the public will go for the better show, whether it's live or on film, and he contends his own can produce a better one on film. Bing Crosby Enterprises is a pioneer in making special films for TV and one of its products the past season was "Lies and Truth."

Everett recalls that once in radio it was believed any major program had to be live—that the public wouldn't stand for one recorded in advance. Now many of the top shows are recorded ahead of time on magnetic tape or high-fidelity discs. And during a day high time observance each summer all but a few shows—even those heard live in daylight time zones—are broadcast in standard time zones from recordings.

He predicts it will be the same in television.
