General Denies Putting Arm Around Communist

SEOUL, Korea — (UP) — Maj. Gen. Henry I. Hodes, a United Nations (UN) delegate to the Kaesong truce talks, denied Sunday around Communist delegate following the first meeting of the armistice subcommittee 15 days ago.

The report was carried in a pooled dispatch filed by an Associated Press correspondent from Kaesong on Aug. 17.

Hodes said he and others present at the time, including a UN delegate, Rear Adm. Arleigh A. Burke, were requested by the UN photographers to move closer together with the Communist delegates for a more compact picture. Hodes said he moved closer to one of the Communist delegates, Maj. Lee Sang Cho of the North Korean army, and that his right hand—holding a brief case—was obscured.

"But in no conceivable manner was it placed around Gen. Lee in any gesture of camaraderie," Hodes said.

Published photographs show Hodes' hand obscured but not around Lee's body.

Higher Taxes Can Be Paid, Snyder Says

WASHINGTON — (UP) — Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder said Sunday Americans are "pretty well off" and can pay higher taxes without injury to the national economy.

He said the average American's purchasing power has increased 40 per cent since 1939, even taking into consideration higher prices and steeper taxes.

This makes it possible, he said, for the economy to absorb a tax increase, which congress is now paring, with plenty left over "for profits and incentives."

Actually, congress is expected to vote far less in new taxes than the \$10,700,000,000 requested by the administration to help pay for the defense program and act as a curb on inflation.

The senate finance committee hopes to finish action this week on a tax measure that is not likely to recommend much more than \$6,000,000,000 in new levies.

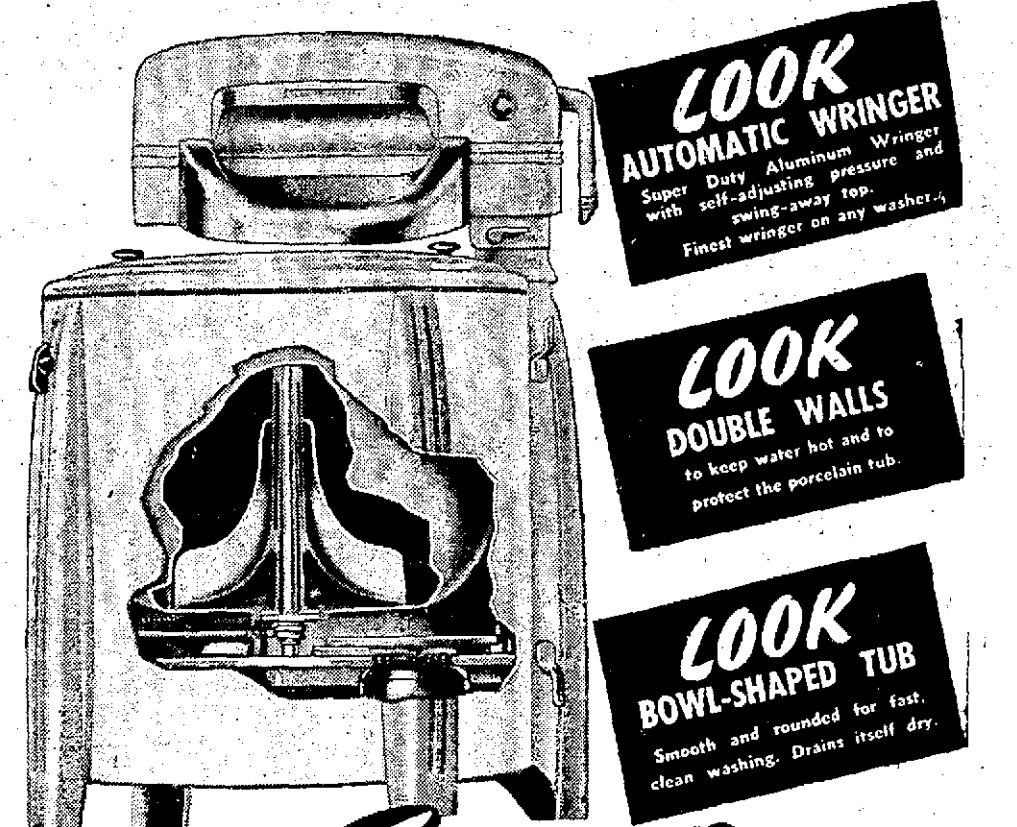
Snyder said in a radio interview that the 40 per cent increase in purchasing power "means that we have accomplished an amazing thing in raising the standard of living in this country in the last 12 years."

"No other nation in history ever before made such progress," he said. "Yes, our economy can absorb the burden of the additional tax program, now pending, with a good margin left over for profits and incentives."

Democratic Sens. Paul H. Douglas, Ill., and Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., have said they will try to increase the total in new taxes when the senate finance committee bill reaches the senate. But the senate seldom upsets the decisions of its tax-writing finance committee.

The house has approved a \$7,200,000,000 tax hike, making it likely that the final version will be somewhere around \$6,500,000,000.

Senate Democratic leaders hope to bring the tax bill up for senate action next week, and pass it in a few days. It is one of the biggest remaining "must" measures standing in the way of congressional adjournment—tentatively slated for Oct. 7.

The rest of the defense was easy.

East took the ace of clubs and returned a diamond at once.

Dummy was permitted to win with the king of diamonds, and then South had to lose two diamonds and a heart. Down one.

At the other table, South was no technician.

He just knew human nature.

He won the first trick with the ace of hearts and led his singleton club at once.

At this table also West unhesitatingly played low, naturally enough.

But at this table West's lack of a problem was very revealing.

The second declarer said: "When I fired that club right at him, West wasn't expecting it."

"If he held the ace, the chances were better than even that he'd play it right away."

"Even if he didn't play his ace, he might still hesitate or indicate in some way that he had a problem."

"But when he played a low club without batting an eye, I would have bet ten to one that he didn't hold the ace."
