Signal Corps Demonstrates Television 'Eyes'



An army television ground crew goes into action in Washington to demonstrate the new mobile TV unit capable of transmitting pictures from remote areas to commanders, umpires, and military classrooms.

The "eyes" carried in four 31-foot long buses, cost about \$700,000. The unit has three TV cameras, 10 receivers and a projector that will show life-size pictures in addition to its power, inter-communication radio, and microphone units.

U. W. Professor to Take Post at Minnesota U.

Prof. Werner W. Boehm, since 1946 a member of the department of social work at the University of Wisconsin, will join the staff of the University of Minnesota this fall, the university announced Thursday.

Boehm will act as major adviser in casework at Minnesota, as well as teach the advanced seminar on family casework and participate in the teaching of the doctoral seminar.

Educated at the Universities of Wurzburg, Germany, Zurich, Switzerland, and Dijon, France, in 1937. He studied at Tulane university, New Orleans, where he acquired a master's degree in social work in 1941. Subsequently he was employed as caseworker with the Community Service society, New York, and the Family society, Boston.

From 1944 to 1946 he served in the medical department of the U. S. Army as psychiatric social worker and later as coordinator of non-medical facilities at Bruns General Hospital, Santa Fe, N. M.

In Madison Boehm has been active as a member of the board of directors of the Community Welfare council and of the Wisconsin Welfare conference.

He is also a member of the American Association of Social Workers, the American Association of Psychiatric Social Workers, and the American Association of University Professors.

He has published numerous articles in social work journals both here and abroad.

Farmers of 4 Counties to Visit U. W. Farm

Farmers from four counties will be visiting the electrical research farm west of Madison, operated by the University of Wisconsin, next week.

Driver of Runaway Truck Risks Life to Save Children

DULUTH, Minn. — (UP) — A truck driver risked his own life Friday to save school children going home for lunch from possible injury.

He won his gamble. Rudolph Korcki, 22, refused to jump as his gasoline truck got out of control and roared down a steep hill. Fearful it would crash into the sidewalks jammed with school children, he stayed at the wheel and steered the truck — loaded with 1,000 gallons of gasoline — as it careened down the hill for 15 blocks.

It finally crashed into three other trucks, a parked car, and a shed, and came to a stop near a lumber yard. Korcki and two other men suffered minor injuries.

Police, who spotted the truck as it raced down the hill, followed in a patrol car, with sirens screaming to warn pedestrians and motorists.

They said Korcki's action in refusing to jump or steer the truck into the curbing saved the lives of the many school children who were on the sidewalks.
