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REDUCE CONGRESS RAMSPECK URGES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27—Chairman Robert Ramspeck of the Civil Service Commission—formerly Rep. Ramspeck (D-Ga.)—says membership in the House of Representatives should be reduced by about one-half.

He says each enlarged congressional district then should elect two representatives, one to Congress and the other to represent the people with the executive branch. This is necessary because of the size of the job facing the congressman of today, Ramspeck says.

The Georgian initially made his suggestion in 1945—his last year as a representative—to the Joint Committee on the Reorganization of Congress. "It was not given the proposal in an address at Devon 'Big government, like big business, must have more layers of responsibility," he said. "The lesser layers of officialdom are not a evil known, but they make the structure and prepare the data upon which the known officials make decisions. We must be sure that they are dedicated, honest people, devoted to the public interest—not to some private interest."

"In the early days, senators and congressmen did not have their time consumed with the problems of representing constituents in matters pending for decision in the executive branch.

"Now most of their time is consumed. As a result, the time they can devote to legislative problems is limited. This is a most difficult problem for them. I know from experience. If they fall in their country with constituents, they do not get reelected."

Ramspeck said his proposal would require a constitutional amendment to:

1. Prohibit the legislative representatives from invading the jurisdiction of the executive branch.
2. Keep the representative of the executive branch from attempting to influence legislation.

"Any big business would adopt a similar solution—that is, divide the job when it becomes too difficult for one man," Ramspeck says. "If some solution is not found, good men will not be willing to serve in the Congress. The burden has become too great."

The Senate has lightened its load by providing each senator with an executive assistant. "That has created a problem in connection with keeping the government responsible to the people," Ramspeck said in his speech. "These assistants, I have no doubt, are doing their best—but you, the public, did not elect them."
