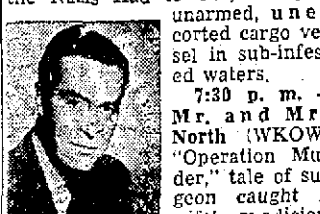

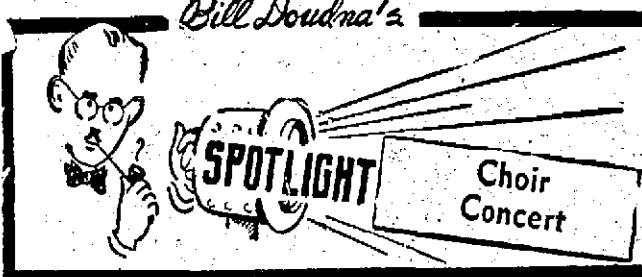

CHICAGO (U.P.)—The Inland Daily Press ass. declared Monday that President Truman's order giving government agencies the authority to classify news is a "serious and unwarranted interference with the free flow of information."

Editors attending the association's 67th annual meeting adopted a resolution which said that the people have the "right to know about the activities of those by whom they are governed."
