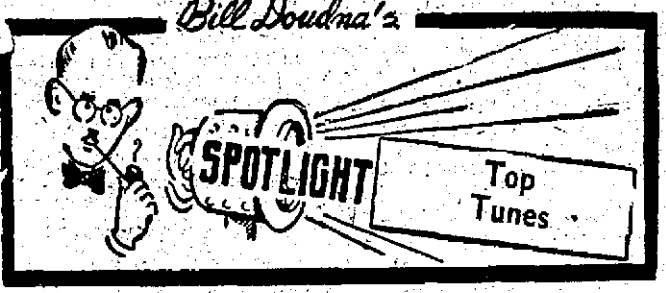

Davis Convicted by Swiss Court

Charged with Spying for Sen. McCarthy

LAUSANNE, Switzerland.—(AP)—The Swiss federal court Monday convicted Charles E. Davis, 28, Fribourg, of political espionage.

The American was charged with spying on Communists and United States diplomatic personnel in Switzerland on behalf of U. S. agents and Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Ordered Expelled

The court sentenced Davis to eight months imprisonment, ordered him expelled from Switzerland, and barred his re-entry for 10 years.

Judge Albert Rais, presiding in the five-man court, in sentencing Davis said that the American had furnished information to U. S. officials in the Geneva consulate-general and the Paris embassy.

The judge added:

"He put himself at the service of the Republican Sen. McCarthy, with whom he was in contact either directly or through the intermediary, the agent of McCarthy in Paris, to whom he sent similar intelligence of a political nature, observing in addition for him, the American diplomatic personnel in Switzerland."

The court identified the McCarthy intermediary in Paris as John E. Farrant.

Charges Forged

Judge Rais charged Davis with forging a document in an effort to demonstrate falsely that John Carter Vincent, then minister of the U. S. in Bern, had Communist connections. The judge declared:

"Davis sent from Geneva on Nov. 4, 1950, in agreement with Farrant, a telegram to Mr. Vincent, with the false signature of Staempfli, one of the militant Geneva Communists, to make it appear that the minister had relations in Switzerland with the Communists. He sent to Farrant a copy of this telegram which consists of a forgery. Davis has received from McCarthy, through the intermediary of Farrant, money for this activity."

Must Pay Costs

The court sentenced Davis to pay the costs of the long investigation and trial. The amount was not set.

Davis told correspondents: "It is true that I have been in direct contact with the senator (McCarthy) and the history of the telegram and the money was that it was directly to discredit the minister."

Asked how he came in contact with Farrant, Davis said: "His

Byrnes Will Push Probe of Reported Loans to Tax Aide

GREEN BAY—(UP)—Rep. John Byrnes (R-Wis.) said Tuesday that he's asked for a "complete" review of charges that an internal revenue bureau official in Chicago had accepted loans from persons with tax cases pending before him.

Byrnes said he has asked the staff of a house subcommittee investigating the bureau to prepare a "complete report" on the case and to search for a red book supposedly containing allegations against the official.

Byrnes, a member of the subcommittee, said the red book presumably had been turned over to the internal revenue bureau, but was not in the file the bureau submitted to the subcommittee.

The red book "contained a number of charges and allegations that would throw high suspicion of misconduct by a high official in the Chicago office of the bureau."

He said the official was in the estate tax section of the Chicago office.

"I don't know whether there's anything wrong in the Chicago office or not," Byrnes said. "But I think we should get to the bottom of it."

He said the bureau completed an investigation of the case in August and "there didn't seem to be too much in it" then, but he felt it should be reopened because of the information presumably contained in the missing red book.
